SUBJECT: Second Winter Update

The purpose for this afternoon's meeting is to discuss:

- update on the 2010 Session;
- summary of Maintenance of Effort legislative proposals at circle 1;
- new statewide bill affecting Montgomery County: House Bill 169 – *Marilyn J. Praisner Safe and Earth-Friendly Roadway Act*, at circle 3;
- new local bills: MC 22-10 – *Sales and Use Tax – Exemption- Lodging at Corporate Training Center*; and MC 23-10 – *Montgomery County – Election Law – Days of Early Voting*, at circle 10;
- status of local and bi-county legislation at circle 16;
- local bond bill list, to date, at circle 19; and
- anything else.

MOE bills introduced through 2/4/10

1. SB 310 / HB 304

Sponsored by members of the Joint Legislative Workgroup to Study State, County, and Municipal Fiscal Relationships

These emergency bills revise the considerations for granting a waiver and the timing of a decision. They do not address issues related to penalties or appeals.

The considerations are listed as follows:

- external environmental factors such as a loss of a major employer or industry affecting a county or a broad economic downturn affecting more than one county;
- a county's tax bases;
- rate of inflation relative to growth of student population in a county;
- maintenance of effort requirement relative to a county's statutory ability to raise revenues;
- a county governing body's history of exceeding the required maintenance of effort amount under paragraph (1)(ii) of this subsection;
- the existence of an agreement between a county governing body and a county board that a waiver should be granted;
- significant reductions in state aid to a county and municipalities of the county for the fiscal year for which a waiver is applied.

2. SB 403

Sponsored by Pinsky, Exum, Harrington, Lenett, Madaleno, and Raskin

This bill relates only to the penalty for not complying with MOE. The Comptroller would be required to withhold funds due the county governing body, in the same amount as that which would be withheld under current law from K-12 education aid. It leaves the same penalty provisions in tact for not complying with the statute governing comprehensive master plans.

3. SB 476

Sponsored by Currie, King, Peters, and Exum

The bill relates only to the penalty, which would allow no K-12 education aid to be withheld in FY 10 only. The bill would also require the Senate Budget and Tax and Ways and Means Committees to report by December 31, 2010 on the appropriate calculation and penalty for failure to meet MOE, including who should be penalized.

4. HB 410

Sponsored by Hixson and 24 others

This emergency bill waives the MOE requirement for all 24 subdivisions for FY 11 only.

5. HB 223

Sponsored by the Montgomery County Delegation.

This emergency bill waives the MOE requirement for Montgomery County for FY 10 only.

6. HB 662

Sponsored by 16 of the 21 PGeo Delegation members.

This bill waives the MOE penalty for FY 10 only.

14 WHEREAS, House Joint Resolution 14 of 2001 created the Task Force to Study
15 Lighting Efficiency and Light Pollution in Maryland; and

16 WHEREAS, The purpose of the Task Force was to study the cost, extent, and
17 consequences of inefficient public lighting and light pollution in the State, and the
18 benefits of improvements; and

19 WHEREAS, The Task Force issued a report to the General Assembly in 2002
20 that stated three objectives, including reducing or halting the spread of sky glow,
21 reducing or halting the increase of light trespass or glare, and conserving energy and
22 minimizing the State's energy costs; and

23 WHEREAS, The Task Force and the resolution that established it found that
24 State, county, and municipal roadway lighting consumes a significant amount of
25 energy and public funds and contributes to light pollution, sky glow, glare, and light
26 trespass; and

27 WHEREAS, It is the policy of the State that new and replacement roadway
28 lighting be procured, designed, configured, and maintained in a manner that
29 minimizes glare, light pollution, and unnecessary energy consumption, and maximizes
30 safety for drivers, pedestrians, and bicyclists; now, therefore,

31 SECTION 1. BE IT ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF
32 MARYLAND, That the Laws of Maryland read as follows:
