## Dedication

The 2009 Register of Champion Trees is dedicated to the memory of Victor J. Pepe (June 22, 1933 - November 1, 2008), in honor of his dedicated stewardship of Flora's Oak and his establishment of a certified tree farm at Stella's Dream in Barnesville.

When the Forestry Board identified Flora's Oak as the new county champion white oak in 1991, the tree measured a total of 357 points. It was 5 points larger than the existing champion Linden Oak on 355 and Beach Drive. Victor dedicated himself to the health and well-being of this tree.

In November of 2007, John Bennett and his team measured Flora's Oak in their search for Maryland's new State Tree to replace the Wye Oak. There were eleven contenders from all over the State. Flora's Oak measured a total of 407 points – becoming the new State Champion and the new Maryland State Tree! But before the Governor could officially dedicate Flora's Oak, it was felled by a violent storm on June 4, 2008. Victor, his family, the community and the state all mourned the loss of this beloved and beautiful champion tree, just as Victor's family, friends and community mourn the loss of Flora's Oak's devoted steward. # THE GREYDON TOLSON AWARD

In 2007 the Montgomery County Forestry Board established The Greydon Tolson Forest Resource Conservationist Award. This award is designed to recognize individuals or organizations that have made a significant commitment to advancing the science, education, technology, and/or practice of Forestry in Montgomery County, Maryland.

The Board was proud to present the first Award in April 2007 to Greydon Tolson himself who, sadly, passed away shortly after receiving this award. Please refer to the 2007 Register of Champion Trees to learn more about Greydon. The Forestry Board is pleased to have planted an autumn-blooming cherry tree in memory of Greydon Tolson at Bethesda-Chevy Chase High School (Greydon's alma mater) with the generous support of Mr. Steve Kelly and Irwin Stone in Rockville.

With pride and pleasure, the Forestry Board announces that the 2008 Award was presented to Dr. Joseph A. Rice, Jr. at the Arbor Day Celebration at the Ag History Farm Park on April 27, 2008. An American elm was planted in his honor at the Lathrop E. Smith Environmental Education Center in Rockville. The 2009 Award is to be presented to Mr. Joe Howard at the Arbor Day Celebration on April 26, 2009.

## 2008

**Joe Rice**, high school teacher, college professor and Christmas tree farmer, was born in Washington, DC but has lived most of his life in Damascus, Maryland. He served on the Montgomery County Forest Conservancy District Board for 20 years. Early in his tenure he became president and breathed new life into Board activities. During this time he initiated larger and more frequent school reforestation projects. He took responsibility for organizing the annual meeting of the Maryland Association of Forest Conservancy District Boards at the Lathrop e. Smith Environmental Education Center on September 28 and 29, 1984. He supported the effort to develop a register of champion trees for Montgomery County. He donated trees and demonstrated correct planting procedures at a workshop for county citizens at the Lathrop Smith Center. When the annual Forestry Board family picnic was begun, he and his wife Sarah hosted the event for several years.

Joe Rice also served two separate three-year terms as president of the Maryland Association of Forest Conservancy District Boards. During his first term he was responsible for rewriting the Association's constitution and by-laws, bringing them up to date, and worked hard to get all 24 local Boards active and involved. He also was very instrumental in getting what was then known as the "Forestry Camp" for high school students reactivated and reenergized.

When he learned there was an inactive Forestry Boards Foundation, he did some extensive research and was responsible for reinstating the Foundation and using it to raise considerable monies for forestry projects in Maryland. In the process, he updated the by-laws and acquired tax-exempt status for the Foundation.

Throughout his career, Joe's dedication, exemplary leadership and unselfish service have benefitted forestry in Montgomery County as well as the state of Maryland. The Montgomery County Forestry Board is proud to have selected Joe Rice as the 2008 recipient of the Greydon Tolson Forestry Stewardship Award. Congratulations and thanks to Joe Rice!

## 2009

When you spot the van with the vanity tag "PLANT 1", you know you've spotted **Joe Howard**. Joe has spent his life creating opportunities to educate young and old about the joys of forests and trees and personally caring for our woodland environment (whether planting a tree, picking up trash, or rescuing a tree from a strangling vine).

Joe's legendary persistence and extraordinary efforts led him to found Montgomery County's Outdoor Education Program and establish the county's first dedicated outdoor education facility, the Lathrop E. Smith Environmental Education Center in 1974. Joe has been responsible for seeing that thousands of trees were planted at both the Smith Center and the neighboring park, transforming the meadow into an arboretum of specimen trees and evergreen forests.

Joe's persistence and vision lead to the creation and placement of three different Steve Weitzman sculptures carved from dead trees, two of which depict children planting trees, and all of which inspire our citizens, both county and state. One is found at the Smith Center, one in the lobby of the Montgomery County Judicial Center in Rockville, and one in the lobby of DNR's Tawes Office Building in Annapolis.

Once Joe joined the Montgomery County Forestry Board, he:

- Established and still manages Montgomery County's Champion Tree Program. This data has been incorporated into the County's Forest Conservation Law to encourage protection of our significant trees.
- Served as president of the Board for two separate terms.
- Re-established Montgomery County as a Tree City USA.
- Motivated the state forester to encourage each county to name a county tree.
- Encouraged each county to invite an educator to join their Forestry Board.
- Instituted Community Service Days (for clean-ups and pruning of trees) at the Audubon Naturalist Society, Rockville Cemetery, Smith Center, and B-CC High School.
- Serves on the MNCPPC's Montgomery County Arbor Day Committee which plans and runs the annual Arbor Day celebration at the Agricultural History Farm Park.
- Represents the Forestry Board's Champion Trees Program with a display at the County's annual Arbor Day celebration and other events.
- Leads annual Champion Tree Tours for Brookside Gardens and other groups.
- Presents illustrated lectures on Montgomery County's Champion Trees to Garden Clubs and similar groups.

# BIG TREES

The Montgomery County Forestry Board is proud to present the following 2009 Register of Champion Trees, Montgomery County, Maryland.

The State of Maryland's "Noted Tree List" was begun by our first state forester, Fred Besley, in 1925--the first such list in the country. In 1940 the American Forestry Association inaugurated a Big Tree Contest for the entire United States, and Maryland led the country in the number of national champions. Today there are over 600 different champion species on the national list, and Montgomery County may have three of those: the champion *Viburnum Blackhaw* tree, and as-yet-to-be-crowned national champion *Cockspur Hawthorn* and *Pawpaw* (pictured on this year's cover).

Joe Howard and the Montgomery County Forestry Board began Montgomery County's champion tree list in 1989 with 42 champion species. Since then the Forestry Board has held a bi-annual Big Tree Contest throughout Montgomery County to identify new champions.

This year's contest drew 60 nominations and resulted in the listing of 40 new county champions (5 of which are returning champions), 6 new species added to the list, and 6 new state champions. The 2009 Register now lists the largest known trees of 162 species identified in Montgomery County as of November 30, 2008. Fifty-seven of these are Maryland State Champions, and the three listed above are potential national champs. Montgomery County continues to have more identified state champion species than any other county in Maryland.

The location of each champion tree and names of the owner and nominator follow each listing.

## Some Montgomery County Champion Trees You Can Easily Visit

In the **Bethesda** area, several champion trees are located on the grounds of **FASEB**, 9650 Rockville Pike:

- Purple Beech, *Fagus sylvatica*, v. *atropunicea*, Edge of large lawn, south of main buildings
- Eastern Hemlock, *Tsuga Canadensis*
- American Holly, *Ilex opaca*
- Japanese Yew, *Taxus cuspidata*
- And just up the **Pike**, at Beach Drive is the returning champion White Oak, *Quercus alba* (the "Linden Oak")

In **Chevy Chase**, on the grounds of the **Audubon Naturalist Society's** Woodend Sanctuary, 8940 Jones Mill Road, you'll find the champion:

- Cedar of Lebanon, *Cedrus libani*
- American Linden, *Tilia Americana*
- Japanese Maple, *Acer palmatum*
- English Oak, *Quercus robur*
- And at Chevy Chase **Circle**, the champion Post Oak, *Quercus stellata*

The **Silver Spring** area is home to the champion:

- Red Maple, *Acer rubrum*, at St. John the Baptist Church on New Hampshire Ave
- Yellow Buckeye, *Aesculus octandra*, in Sligo Creek Park near Brunett Ave
- Sawtooth Oak, *Quercus acutissima*, Sligo Creek Park at Brunett Ave & Bruce Dr

- Baldcypress, *Taxodium ascendens*, at the corner of Noyes Dr and Alton Pkwy

In **Wheaton, Brookside Gardens** is home to many champions:

- Himalayan Pine, *Pinus wallichiana*, near Conservatory
- Paperbark Maple, *Acer griseum*,
- Sweetbay magnolia, *Magnolia virginiana*, near Visitor's Center

In the **Northeast** parts of the County, check out the champion

- White Ash, *Fraxinus Americana*, in the Auburn Village Park in Sandy Spring
- Pagoda Tree, *Sophora japonica*, in front of Clubhouse A in Leisure World
- White Pine, *Pinus strobus*, in Olney at Olney Acres Park
- Black Walnut, *Juglans nigra*, in Olney in front of the thrift shop at Montgomery General Hospital

And in the **Northwest** areas of the County, look for

- Northern Catalpa, *Catalpa speciosa*, on Route 28 in Darnestown
- Leyland Cypress, *cupressocyparis leylandii*, Needwood Mansion in Derwood
- English Elm ("Goshen Elm") on Goshen Road in Gaithersburg
- Smooth leaved Elm, *Ulmus carpinifolia pendula*, at the Rockville Civic Center

# THREATS TO THE FOREST AND TREES

## Non-Native Invasives “NNIs”

Have you noticed the new piece of species information in the 2009 Register? It’s the “N” or “NNI” designation – “native” or “non-native invasive”.

Non-native invasive plants (NNIs) are species that have been introduced intentionally or accidentally into environments where they did not evolve. When these species move into areas where their own natural controls are missing, they can spread unchecked, with major negative effects to our environment, economy and/or health. A NNI can

- kill mature trees by shading, girdling, or causing heavily burdened trees to topple;
- eliminate entire native plant communities, wildlife habitats and wildlife food sources; and
- alter ecosystems.

Experts consider NNIs to be the second greatest threat to biodiversity after outright habitat destruction.

Which NNI species cause the most damage in Montgomery County?

There are NNI trees, shrubs, vines, and herbaceous plants which are highly invasive in Montgomery County. However, the overgrowth of NNI VINES is of particular concern for the health of our trees. A current short list of the worst NNI vines includes:

- ✘ **English ivy** (*Hedera helix*)
- ✘ **Five-leaved akebia** (*Akebia quinata*)
- ✘ **Japanese honeysuckle** (*Lonicera japonica*)
- ✘ **Kudzu** (*Pueraria montana v. lobata*)
- ✘ **Mile-a-minute** (*Polygonum perfoliatum*)
- ✘ **Oriental bittersweet** (*Celastrus orbiculatus*)
- ✘ **Porcelain-berry** (*Ampelopsis brevipedunculata*)
- ✘ **Winter-creeper** (*Euonymus fortunei*)
- ✘ **Wisteria, Chinese & Japanese** (*Wisteria sinensis*; *W. floribunda*)

## What can you do to help?

You will be doing your part to preserve our forests for the future generations if you can:

- Learn to recognize the problem NNI plants
- Decide to not buy or plant them
- Make an effort to keep them from seeding and eventually remove them from your own property
- Consider joining a volunteer effort to control their growth on public wild acres ([www.mc-mncppc.org/Environment/weed\\_warriors/](http://www.mc-mncppc.org/Environment/weed_warriors/))
- Educate your friends and neighbors about the issue
- Establish native plants in your yards and gardens and plant native trees.



## CITIZEN ALERT REMAINS IN PLACE - Emerald Ash Borer

The emerald ash borer is a seriously invasive insect which feeds on and kills ash trees one to three years after infestation. Ash trees are the most common tree growing in Baltimore City and make up 20% of Maryland's riparian forests. To date, the only known remedy for these insects is destruction of the infested trees. The emerald ash borer became established in the Brandywine Area of Prince George's County after infected nursery stock arrived at a local nursery in 2003, and in August 2008 the emerald ash borer was discovered in areas of neighboring Charles County as well. The Maryland Departments of Agriculture and Natural Resources have created and monitor eradication zones in the two Counties wherein all ash trees have been identified and removed for chipping and disposal.

### "Don't Pack Firewood - Buy it Where you Burn it"

To help control the spread of this dangerous beetle, Maryland citizens and visitors are being asked to comply with the established quarantine and refrain from transporting firewood from the infested area in Prince George's County and Charles County to any other area and from other states into Maryland.

### LOOK FOR:

Emerald Ash Borer adults are dark metallic green, one-half-inch in length and 1-sixteenth of an inch wide. They are present from mid-May until early-August. Affected trees show symptoms of infestation including: die-back on the upper third of the tree, D-shaped exit holes in the bark where adults emerge, and vertical splits in the bark. If you suspect an Emerald Ash Borer infestation, contact the Maryland Department of Agriculture at 410-841-5920.

# You Can Nominate a Champion Tree

The Montgomery County Forestry Board solicits and compiles nominations for champion trees from April through November in even numbered years. A professional forester measures the nominated trees, and new championship certificates are awarded in April of odd numbered years as part of the County's annual Arbor Day Celebration at the Agricultural History Farm Park. You can nominate a champion tree at any time.

If you think you have discovered a tree larger than the ones noted or a tree species for which there is no champion, the Forestry Board welcomes your nomination. The nominated tree must have a single trunk for at least four and one-half feet above ground level and a total height of at least fifteen feet.

## How is A Tree Measured?

Fred Besley devised the measuring system for Maryland in 1925 that would become standard for the national competition started by the American Forestry Association in 1940. In fact Fred Besley provided the first official measurement of the recently departed Wye Oak.

To evaluate the relative size of a tree, the circumference of the trunk in inches (at 4.5 feet above the ground) and the height and crown spread in feet are added together to arrive at a number of points for each tree. This number is then used for comparison of tree sizes in each species. The formula is:

**Circumference (inches) + height of tree (feet) + 25% of the average crown spread (feet) = Total Points.**
