

Geographic Dispersion of Seniors in the County






Senior Population Growth

Growth in 65+ Population for State of Maryland




Between 2010 and 2040, the Montgomery County senior population is projected to grow from 119,770 to 254,530, a growth of 113%. This exceeds the overall senior population growth in Maryland, which is expected to grow from 707,640 to 1,418,640 over this timeframe, a growth of 100%

% of total population




Among all age groups, only 65-80 and 80+ are forecasted to increase as percentages of the total population.

Montgomery County Seniors 65+ by Race and Hispanic or Latino Origin






Montgomery County Housing as Percentage of Income



Montgomery County Seniors 65+ With a Disability






In 2013, 29% of seniors 65+ living in the community report having at least one disability.

Montgomery County Senior Working Status






- Most seniors who are non-working are not part of the labor force, for reasons such as retirement.
- Only a small fraction of non-working seniors are seeking employment and unable to find work.

Senior Income





In Montgomery County, 15% of seniors 65+ have income less than \$25k/year, versus 25% for all seniors 65+ in Maryland.

Elder Abuse



- Adult protective services referrals for seniors increased from 571 in FY2011 to 776 in FY2014 (an increase of nearly 40%).
- The increase in cases referred can be attributed in part to a new law requiring banks to report suspected financial abuse.
- Only about 1 in 7 incidents of abuse are reported.
