- Hearing Assistive Technology: Audio induction loop, a hearing assistive technology, are available in library meeting rooms that can be used during a library sponsored program. When you request the audio loop, a microphone will then be reserved. To make this arrangement, contact the library three (3) work days in advance.
- Videophones: Three Video Phone Booths have been installed. They are available at the Germantown Library, the Rockville Memorial Library and the Silver Spring Library.
