Executive Summary

Survey Background

Montgomery County contracted with National Research Center, Inc. (NRC) to conduct a county-wide resident survey. The 2007 Montgomery County Resident Survey serves as a consumer report card for the County by providing residents the opportunity to rate the quality of life in the county, as well as the community's amenities, service delivery, and their satisfaction with local government. The survey also permits residents to provide feedback to government on what is working well and what is not, and to communicate their priorities for community planning and resource allocation. This is the first general survey of Montgomery County residents since 1994.

Methods

Three thousand randomly selected Montgomery County households were mailed the 2007 Montgomery County Resident Survey. Of the 2,896 households that received the survey, 917 responded to the mailed questionnaire, giving a response rate of 32%.

The cover letter and survey were mailed to residents in English. However, the survey packet included a one-page insert with paragraphs in five languages (Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, and French) that described the contents of the packet and provided a phone number to call if the resident wanted to receive the survey in one of those languages. In total, 78 calls were received, and 68 translated surveys were sent to these residents. Forty-two completed in-language surveys were received.

Survey results were weighted so that respondent age, gender, and ethnicity were represented in the proportions reflective of the entire County. The margin of error is plus or minus three percentage points around any given percentage.

Summary of Results

Quality of Life and Community

- Overall, Montgomery County residents gave positive ratings to their quality of life.
 - ◆ Eighty-six percent of the respondents rated Montgomery County “good” or “excellent” as a place to live.
 - ◆ About the same proportion (82%) of the respondents rated their neighborhood “good” or “excellent” as a place to live.
 - ◆ Seventy-nine percent of the respondents said the overall quality of life in Montgomery County was “excellent” or “good.”
- On the other hand, only 41% of the respondents felt that Montgomery County was “good” or “excellent” as a place to retire.
- Respondents gave favorable ratings to the majority of Montgomery County characteristics.
 - ◆ The overall image or reputation of Montgomery County was highly regarded by respondents: 84% said it was “excellent” or “good.”
 - ◆ A majority of County characteristics were perceived to be “excellent” or “good” by more than half of the respondents; recreational opportunities, educational opportunities, volunteer

- opportunities, opportunities to attend cultural activities, overall appearance of Montgomery County, openness and acceptance of the community toward people of diverse backgrounds, and employment opportunities received the highest ratings.
- ◆ Among the County characteristics that received lower quality ratings were the availability of affordable child care, the availability of affordable housing, pedestrian safety, the amount of public parking, the availability of affordable health care, and ease of car travel in Montgomery County; more than half of the respondents said that the availability of affordable housing was “poor.”
 - Survey respondents reported using and participating in a wide variety of County services and activities.
 - ◆ More than 9 in 10 respondents (94%) reported that they had recycled used paper, cans, or bottles from their home at least once in the last 12 months, with 75% of the respondents reporting they had recycled more than 26 times.
 - ◆ Eighty-six percent of the respondents reported having visited a park in the County at least once in the last 12 months, and 78% had used Montgomery County public libraries or their services.
 - ◆ However, only 23% of the respondents reported having attended a meeting of local elected officials or other local government meetings open to the public at least once in the last 12 months.
 - In general, respondents reported feeling safe in Montgomery County.
 - ◆ The majority of survey respondents said they felt “very” or “somewhat” safe from violent and property crimes in the county.
 - ◆ While safety in one’s neighborhood and in downtown areas after dark received lower ratings, two-thirds of the respondents reported feeling safe in their neighborhood after dark, and half felt safe in Montgomery County’s downtown areas after dark.
 - The rates of population growth and commercial growth were a concern to most respondents.
 - ◆ Eighty-two percent of the respondents felt that the rate of population growth was “too fast,” 17% said it was the “right amount,” and only 1% said it was “too slow.”
 - ◆ Just over half of the respondents (56%) said that commercial growth was “too fast,” 36% said it was the “right amount,” and 7% said it was “too slow.”

County Government Services

- Respondents evaluated most County services favorably, and the majority of services were seen as important by respondents.
 - ◆ The majority of County services were said to be “excellent” or “good” by half or more of the respondents.
 - ◆ Fire services, ambulance or emergency medical services, recycling, public library services, and parks received the highest ratings.
 - ◆ Land use, planning and zoning; code enforcement; and cable television providers received the lowest quality ratings. [Although included in the survey, cable television is not a service provided by the County (a fact that was not noted on the questionnaire).]
 - ◆ Half or more of the respondents said that each service was “essential” or “very important.” The most important services were fire services, ambulance or emergency medical services,

police services, and drinking water. [Although included in the survey, drinking water is not a service provided by the County (a fact that was not noted on the questionnaire).]

- Respondents were positive in their feedback about County employees.
 - ◆ Of those who had contact with an employee, three-quarters said the employee's courteousness and knowledge were "excellent" or "good."

Issues Facing the County

- Respondents felt that crime, traffic, and public schools were the most important issues the County should address.
- When asked what most needed to be improved or fixed about Montgomery County, respondents most frequently noted traffic congestion and flow, affordable housing, and growth.

Overall Perceptions of the County

- The overall quality of County services was viewed positively.
 - ◆ Twelve percent of the respondents said the overall quality of County services was "excellent," two-thirds said "good," one-quarter reported "fair," and only 2% felt it was "poor."
- Thirty-six percent of the respondents felt that they "pay too much for the services they receive," while 32% were "satisfied with the current level of taxes and services."
- Half of the survey participants felt that the value of services for the taxes paid to the County and the overall direction the County was taking were "excellent" or "good."
- When asked what they liked best about Montgomery County, schools and educational opportunities; parks and recreational opportunities; the environment and appearance of the County; and the safety of the County (including police and fire protection) topped the list.
- The majority of the respondents reported that they would recommend living in Montgomery County to someone who asks (85% said "very" or "somewhat" likely).
 - ◆ Eighty-two percent of the respondents noted that they were likely to remain in Montgomery County for the next five years.
 - ◆ Only 44% of the respondents said they would be likely to retire in Montgomery County.

In Conclusion

The following is a summary of National Research Center, Inc.'s perspectives about the overall results. Additional insight is expected to come from the County's own knowledge of internal workings and local issues.

Generally, respondents were happy to be living in Montgomery County. While respondents reported that Montgomery County was a good place to live and raise a family, a majority were hesitant about retiring there. This may be due in part to a perceived lack of affordable quality housing in an attractive county with a high cost of living.

A majority of the respondents felt safe being out and about in Montgomery County. Residents' participation in and use of activities and programs such as parks in the County, libraries, and recreation centers was high.

Overall, respondents thought that County services were good: the majority of County services received favorable quality ratings. However, there were a few services whose perceived quality did

not match the high importance that most respondents attributed to the service. These services – including health services, emergency preparedness, and snow removal – represent potential opportunities for further analysis and improvement.

Crime, traffic, and public schools were viewed as the most important areas on which the County should focus. At the same time, survey respondents felt satisfied with services that were aimed at two of the most important issues – feelings of safety, and schools and educational opportunities.

Survey Background

Survey Purpose

Montgomery County contracted with National Research Center, Inc. (NRC) to conduct a county-wide resident survey. The Montgomery County Resident Survey serves as a consumer report card for the County by providing residents the opportunity to rate the quality of life in the county, as well as the community's amenities, service delivery, and their satisfaction with local government. The survey also permits residents to provide feedback to government on what is working well and what is not, and to communicate their priorities for community planning and resource allocation. Montgomery County conducted resident surveys approximately biennially from 1985 to 1994; this is the first general survey of county residents since 1994.

The focus on the quality of service delivery and the importance of services helps County officials and staff, the Council, and the public to set priorities for budget decisions and lays the groundwork for tracking community opinions about the core responsibilities of the Montgomery County Government, helping to assure maximum service quality over time.

This type of survey gets at the key services that local government controls to create a quality community. It is akin to private sector customer surveys that are used regularly by many corporations to monitor where there are weaknesses in product or service delivery before customers defect to the competition or before other problems from dissatisfied customers arise.

Methods

Survey Administration and Response Rate

Households received three mailings each beginning in September 2007. The first mailing was a prenotification postcard announcing the upcoming survey. A week after the prenotification postcard was mailed, the first wave of surveys was sent. The second wave was mailed one week after the first. The survey mailings contained a letter from the County Executive and the Council President inviting the household to participate in the 2007 Resident Survey, a questionnaire, and a pre-paid return envelope.

About 3% of the mailed surveys were returned because they either had incorrect addresses or were received by vacant housing units. Of the 2,896 households that received the survey, 917 completed the questionnaire, providing a response rate of 32%. This is a good response rate, higher than NRC often sees in larger jurisdictions.

Reaching Non-English Speaking Residents

The cover letter and survey were mailed to residents in English. However, the survey packet included a one-page insert with paragraphs in five languages (Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean, and French) that described the contents of the packet and provided a phone number to call if the resident wanted to receive the survey in one of those languages.

A call center was available during the day to take calls from non-English speaking residents, and a voice mail box was created for each of the five languages to receive calls after hours. In total, 78 calls were received, and 68 translated surveys were sent to these residents. (More information on outreach

to non-English speakers can be found in Appendix V: Survey Methodology.) Forty-two completed in-language surveys were received.

Understanding the Results

“Don’t Know” Responses and Rounding

On many of the questions in the survey, respondents could answer, “don’t know.” The proportion of respondents giving this reply is shown in the full set of responses included in Appendix II: Frequency of Survey Responses and is discussed in the body of this report if it is 20% or greater. However, the “don’t know” responses have been removed from the tables and analyses presented in the body of the report. In other words, the tables and graphs only display the responses from respondents who had an opinion about a specific item.

For some questions, respondents were permitted to select multiple responses. When the total exceeds 100% in a table for a multiple response question, it is because some respondents are counted in multiple categories. When a table for a question that only permitted a single response does not total to exactly 100%, it is due to the customary practice of rounding percentages to the nearest whole number.

Confidence Intervals

It is customary to describe the precision of estimates derived from surveys by a “level of confidence” (or margin of error). The 95 percent confidence level for this survey is generally no greater than plus or minus three percentage points around any given percent reported for the entire sample (917 completed surveys). Where percentages are given for demographic and other subgroups, they are less precise. Generally the 95% confidence interval is plus or minus five percentage points for samples of about 400 and plus or minus ten percentage points for samples as small as 100.

Report of Results

Quality of Life and Community

In this survey, Montgomery County residents were asked to give their opinions about a series of questions regarding the quality of life in the county; a number of County characteristics; frequency of use and participation in a variety of services and opportunities; safety in the county; and the amount of growth.

Quality of Life in Montgomery County


The first set of survey questions asked respondents to rate several aspects of quality of life in Montgomery County. Most attributes of quality of life were viewed positively by survey participants. Eighty-six percent of the respondents said Montgomery County was “excellent” or “good” as a place to live. Eight in 10 respondents selected “excellent” or “good” for their neighborhood as a place to live (82%), Montgomery County as a place to raise children (81%), Montgomery County as a place to work (78%), and the overall quality of life in Montgomery County (79%). Less than half of the respondents felt that Montgomery County was a “good” or “excellent” place to retire. [Twenty-one percent of the respondents reported “don’t know” when rating Montgomery County as a place to retire. The percentages shown in the table are for those who had an opinion. (See the table and figure on the following page.)]

Older residents were more likely to give positive ratings to their neighborhood as a place to live than were younger residents. Renters and those living in attached housing units gave lower ratings to most aspects of quality of life than homeowners and those living in detached housing units. Non-white respondents gave more favorable ratings to their neighborhood as a place to live and Montgomery County as a place to raise children and as a place to retire than did those who were white. County Characteristics, Opportunities, and Service Availability

The survey provided a list of 24 different County characteristics and asked respondents to rate the quality of each. Respondents gave favorable ratings to the majority of these characteristics. More than half of the respondents felt the majority of County characteristics were “excellent” or “good.” Characteristics thought to be “good” or “excellent” by 80% or more of the respondents included recreational opportunities, educational opportunities, overall image or reputation of Montgomery County, and volunteer opportunities (81%, 81%, 84%, and 80%, respectively). One-third rated these four characteristics as “excellent.”

One-third or less of the respondents said that the availability of affordable health care (35%), ease of car travel in Montgomery County (32%), availability of affordable child care (21%), and availability of affordable housing (14%) were “excellent” or “good.” More than half of the respondents (54%) said that the availability of affordable housing was “poor.” (See Table 2: Community Characteristics on the following page.)

Note that the percentage of “don’t know” responses was at least 20% for the following services: availability of affordable health care (24% percent of the respondents selected “don’t know”), ease of bus travel in Montgomery County (29%), ease of bicycle travel in Montgomery County (34%), availability of affordable child care (45%), availability of services for seniors (54%), and accessibility of County services for disabled persons (57%). The relatively high percentage of “don’t know” responses may be an indication that survey respondents were less likely to have direct experience with these characteristics or services of the County.

Utilization of Public Services and Opportunities for Participation


Survey respondents were asked how many times, if any, in the last 12 months they or another household member had participated in each of 10 activities or programs listed. More than 9 in 10 respondents (94%) reported that they had recycled used paper, cans or bottles from their home at least once in the last 12 months, with 75% of the respondents reporting they had recycled more than 26 times. Eighty-six percent of the respondents reported having visited a park in the County at least once in the last 12 months, and 78% had used Montgomery County public libraries or their services. Fewer respondents reported having attended a meeting of local elected officials or other local government meetings open to the public (only 23% attended such meetings at least once in the past year). (See Figure 2: Participation in Montgomery County Activities and Programs on the following page.)

In general, a higher proportion of residents age 35-54 participated in most of these activities than did those in the other age categories. Renters were more likely to have ridden a Metrobus or Ride On bus within Montgomery County than were homeowners. Residents who spoke a language other than English at home reported participating more frequently in a County recreation program or activity and riding on a Metrobus or Ride On bus within Montgomery County than did those who spoke only English at home. Figure 2: Participation in Montgomery County Activities and Programs




Safety in Montgomery County

A series of questions was included on the survey to gauge resident opinion about safety from crime, safety in neighborhoods, and safety in downtown areas of Montgomery County. Two-thirds of the respondents reported feeling “very” or “somewhat” safe from violent crime in Montgomery County. More than half of the respondents (57%) said they felt at least “somewhat” safe from property crimes in the county.

Figure 3: Ratings of Safety from Crime




Nine in 10 respondents felt “very” or “somewhat” safe in their neighborhood during the day. Eighty-four percent of the respondents said they felt at least “somewhat” safe in Montgomery County’s downtown areas during the day. While safety in one’s neighborhood and in downtown areas after dark received lower ratings, two-thirds of the respondents reported feeling safe in their neighborhood after dark, and half felt safe in Montgomery County’s downtown areas after dark.

As would be expected, fewer females than males reported feeling safe from the various types of crime, in their neighborhood, and in Montgomery County’s downtown areas. Younger respondents reported more favorable ratings of safety in downtown areas during the day and after dark than did older residents.

Figure 4: Ratings of Sense of Safety in Montgomery County




Growth in Montgomery County

Growth is a major concern in many communities across the nation. In order to gauge resident perceptions of this issue, one question on the survey was devoted to the speed of three different types of growth. The majority of the respondents (82%) felt that the rate of population growth was “too fast,” 17% said it was the “right amount,” and 1% said “too slow.” Just over half of the respondents reported that commercial growth was “too fast” (57%), one-third said it was the “right amount,” and 7% said it was “too slow.” The inverse was true for jobs growth: 8% reported the growth in jobs was “too fast,” 51% said it was the “right amount,” and 41 in 10 respondents said it was “too slow.” In assessing the rate of jobs growth, two in five respondents picked “don’t know.”

County Government Services

One page of the survey was dedicated to assessments of the quality of County services. Respondents were asked to rate the quality and importance of a list of 35 services. Survey respondents were also asked to provide their opinions about the quality of County employees. The responses to these questions are presented on the following pages.

Quality of County Services

Survey respondents evaluated most County services favorably. Nearly all respondents rated the quality of fire services as “excellent” or “good.” Nine out of 10 said that ambulance or emergency medical services were “good” or “excellent.” Eighty percent or more of the respondents said the following were “excellent” or “good”: recycling (85%), public library services (85%), parks (85%), garbage collection (if provided by the County; 82%), Montgomery College (85%), police services (81%), public schools (80%), recreation centers or programs (81%), and the condition of County buildings (libraries, recreation centers, etc.; 80%).

The following services were viewed as “excellent” or “good” by less than half of the respondents: preservation of natural areas such as open space and farmland (45%); services for low-income people (40%); services for immigrants (41%); land use, planning and zoning (40%); code enforcement (39%); and cable television providers (35%). [Although included in the survey, cable television is not a service provided by the County (a fact that was not noted on the questionnaire).] See Table 7: Quality of County Services on the following page.

Of the 35 services listed, 23 received a relatively high percentage of “don’t know” responses, ranging from 20% (gas services) to 71% (addiction services). It is possible that the respondents were less likely to have direct contact with these services. Ratings shown in the report are for those respondents who had an opinion (see Appendix II: Frequency of Survey Responses for a complete list of “don’t know” percentages).

Importance of County Services

Survey respondents were also asked to rate the importance of each of the 35 services. Almost all respondents said that fire services (99%), ambulance or emergency medical services (98%), police services (97%), drinking water (96%), electric service (94%), water and sewer services (93%), public schools (91%), and gas service (90%) were “essential” or “very” important. Services thought to be of relatively lower importance included animal control (60%), services for immigrants (56%), and cable television providers (53%). Although included in the survey, drinking water, gas, electric, water and sewer services, and cable television are not services provided by the County (a fact that was not noted on the questionnaire).

The importance of addiction services was the only service that received a high percentage of “don’t know” responses (20% of the respondents said “don’t know”). The ratings importance shown here are for those respondents who had an opinion.



Figure 6: Contact with County Employees in the Last 12 Months



Figure 7: Ratings of County Employee Characteristics




Issues Facing the County

One question on the survey asked respondents to rate the importance of a variety of issues they think the County should address. The most important issues to respondents were crime (93% rated it “essential” or “very” important), traffic (93%), and public schools (K-12; 91%). About 8 in 10 respondents felt that the environment, the pace of growth, and taxes were important issues for the County to address. Issues viewed as slightly less important by respondents were affordable housing (78% reported it to be “essential” or “very” important) and social services for those in need (77%).

Several open-ended questions were included on the questionnaire to allow respondents the opportunity to provide written feedback to the County. One of these questions asked survey participants what they felt most needed to be improved or fixed about Montgomery County. (Note that some respondents gave more than one answer.)

Of the 694 respondents who answered this question, one-third felt that traffic congestion and flow needed to be improved. One-quarter of the respondents noted affordable housing as the area that needs the most improvement, and one in five mentioned growth and development as most needing improvement. Sixteen percent of those who responded to this question stated the County needed to improve the infrastructure, and 13% said crime, police, and safety needed most to be improved. One in 10 respondents felt taxes were too high and needed the most improvement. Less than 10% of the respondents mentioned the remaining areas. Overall Perceptions of the County


Several questions on the survey were geared toward assessing overall perceptions of the County, including the overall quality of services, satisfaction with taxes and services, trust in County government, and the attractiveness of living in Montgomery County. Responses to these questions are reported on the following pages.

Overall Quality of County Services

In addition to evaluating County services separately, survey respondents were asked to rate the overall quality of County services. Twelve percent of the respondents said the overall quality of County services was “excellent,” two-thirds said “good,” one-quarter reported “fair,” and only 2% felt it was “poor.”

Respondents who lived in detached housing units and those born in the U.S. rated the overall quality of County services more favorably than did those respondents who lived in attached units or who were not born in the U.S. (See Appendix III: Survey Results by Demographic Groups for more information.)


Figure 9: Overall Quality of County Services



Satisfaction with Taxes and Services

Several statements regarding the level of taxes paid by residents and the services they receive were included on the survey. Respondents were asked to select the statement that best described their opinion. Thirty-six percent of the respondents selected the statement, “I feel that I pay too much for the services I receive,” and almost as many (32%) selected the statement, “I am satisfied with the current level of taxes and services.” Ten percent said they had no opinion or preference and 9% selected the statement “I am willing to accept service reductions if it means lower taxes.” Less than 1 in 10 chose the statement “I am willing to pay more taxes to get more services” or “my opinion is different from the ones listed here.”

Public Trust in County Government


Residents were provided with several aspects of trust in local government and asked to rate if each was excellent, good, fair or poor. Half or more of the respondents stated that the value of services for the taxes paid to Montgomery County and the overall direction that Montgomery County is taking were “excellent” or “good” (55% and 52%, respectively). However, two in five of the respondents felt that the job Montgomery County government does at listening to residents was “fair,” and 18% said it was “poor.” [Note that a high percentage of the respondents (27%) selected “don’t know” when assessing the job Montgomery County government does at listening to residents.]

Compared to males, females reported more positive ratings for the value of services for the taxes paid to Montgomery County. Renters rated the overall direction the County is taking higher than homeowners. More foreign-born respondents felt that the overall direction the County is taking was “good” or “excellent” than did those who were born in the U.S. (For more information about crosstabulations, see Appendix III: Survey Results by Demographic Groups.)

What Residents Like About Montgomery County

Respondents to the survey were asked to write in what they liked most about Montgomery County today. Some respondents gave more than one answer. Of those persons who responded to the question, one in five reported that what they liked best about Montgomery County were schools and educational opportunities (22%); parks and recreational opportunities (19%); the environment and appearance of the County (17%); and the safety of the County including police and fire protection (17%).

One in 10 of the respondents mentioned the following: proximity to DC and the general location of the County (11%); the diversity of the population (11%); County services and the overall quality of services (10%); the quality of life (9%); and the jobs and economic stability associated with the County (8%). 
Attractiveness of Living in Montgomery County

A set of questions asked respondents to state the likelihood that they would recommend living in Montgomery County to someone else, remain in the County for the next five years, and retire in the County. Eighty-five percent of the respondents said they would be “very” or “somewhat” likely to recommend living in the County to someone who asked, and 82% said they would remain for the next five years. Less than half of the respondents reported that they would be “somewhat” or “very” likely to retire in Montgomery County; 56% selected “somewhat” or “very” unlikely. These opinions are similar to those expressed about Montgomery County as a place to retire, where 60% of the respondents considered it a “fair” or “poor” place to retire.

Appendix V: Survey Methodology

Sample Selection

All households within Montgomery County were eligible to participate in the survey; 3,000 were selected to receive the survey. These 3,000 households were randomly selected from a comprehensive list of all housing units within Montgomery County boundaries. The basis of the list of all housing units was a United States Postal Service listing of housing units with a zip code that, at least partially, serves the County. Since some of the zip codes that serve Montgomery County households also serve addresses that lie outside of the county boundaries, the exact geographic location of each housing unit was compared to County boundaries, using the most current municipal boundary file (updated on a quarterly basis), and addresses located outside of the boundaries of Montgomery County were removed from consideration.

To choose the 3,000 survey recipients, a systematic sampling method was applied to the list of households known to be within Montgomery County. Systematic sampling is a procedure whereby a complete list of all possible items is culled, selecting every Nth one until the appropriate number of items has been selected. Attached units were over sampled as residents of this type of housing typically respond at lower rates to surveys than do those in detached housing units.

An individual within each household was selected using the birthday method. The birthday method selects a person within the household by asking the “person whose birthday has most recently passed” to complete the questionnaire. The underlying assumption in this method is that day of birth has no relationship to the way people respond to surveys. This instruction was contained in the cover letter accompanying the questionnaire.

Survey Administration and Response Rate

Households received three mailings each beginning in September 2007. Completed surveys were collected over the following five weeks. The first mailing was a prenotification postcard announcing the upcoming survey. A week after the prenotification postcard was sent, the first wave of surveys was sent. The second wave was sent one week after the first. The survey mailings contained a letter from the County Executive and the Council President inviting the household to participate in the 2007 Resident Survey, a questionnaire, and a pre-paid return envelope.

About 3% of the surveys were returned because they either had incorrect addresses or were received by vacant housing units. Of the 2,896 eligible households, 917 completed the survey, providing a response rate of 32%. This is a good response rate, higher than NRC often sees in larger jurisdictions.

Reaching Non-English Speaking Residents

The cover letter and survey were mailed to residents in English. However, the survey packet included a one-page insert with paragraphs in five languages (Spanish, Chinese, Vietnamese, Korean and French) that described the contents of the packet and provided a phone number to call if the resident wanted to receive the survey in one of those languages.

A call center was available during the day to take calls from non-English speaking residents, and a voice mail box was created for each of the five languages to receive calls after hours. In total, 78 calls were received, and 68 translated surveys were sent to these residents. Forty-two completed in-language surveys were received. The table below displays all the contacts made, by language.

Confidence Intervals

It is customary to describe the precision of estimates made from surveys by a “level of confidence” (or margin of error). The 95% confidence level for this survey is generally no greater than plus or minus three percentage points around any given percent reported for the entire sample (917 completed surveys). Where percentages are given for demographic or other subgroups, they are less precise. Generally the 95% confidence interval is plus or minus five percentage points for samples of about 400 and plus or minus ten percentage points for samples as small as 100.

Weighting the Data

The demographic characteristics of the survey sample were compared to those found in the 2000 Census estimates and other population norms for Montgomery County and were statistically adjusted to reflect the larger population when necessary. The results of the weighting scheme are presented in the table on the following page. The shaded variables were the ones by which survey results were weighted.

Data Analysis

Completed questionnaires were checked for accuracy by National Research Center, Inc. staff. The data were then entered, and the results analyzed by National Research Center, Inc. staff using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS). For the most part, frequency distributions and mean ratings are presented in the body of the report. A complete set of frequencies for each survey question is presented in Appendix II: Frequency of Survey Responses.

Also included are results by demographic characteristics (Appendix III: Survey Results by Demographic Groups). Chi-square or ANOVA tests of significance were applied to these breakdowns of selected survey questions. A “p-value” of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between groups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed in the selected categories of our sample represent “real” differences among those populations. Where differences between subgroups are statistically significant, they are marked with grey shading in the appendices.

Appendix VI: Normative Comparisons

Putting Evaluations onto a 100-point Scale

Although responses to many of the evaluative or frequency questions were made on four- or five-point scales with 1 representing the best rating, the scales used different labels (e.g., “very satisfied,” “excellent,” “essential”). To make comparisons easier, many of the results in this appendix are reported on a common scale where 0 is the worst possible rating and 100 is the best possible rating. If everyone reported “excellent,” then the result would be 100 on the 0-100 scale. If the ratings were all “good,” the result would be an average rating of 67. An average rating of 33 would be equivalent to “fair,” and 0 would be “poor.” The new scale can be thought of like the thermometer used to represent total giving to United Way. The higher the thermometer reading, the closer to the goal of 100 – in this case, the most positive response possible. The .95 confidence interval around a score on the 0-100 scale based on all respondents typically will be no greater than plus or minus two points on the 100-point scale.

Comparing Survey Results

An average rating of 67 for service quality is at the “good” mark on a 100-point scale that goes from “excellent” to “poor.” Few services actually receive ratings as high as 67 on this scale, and service ratings vary widely. In addition, certain kinds of services tend to be viewed more positively by residents in many communities across the country. For example, police protection tends to be better received than pothole repair by residents of most American cities. Where possible, the more appropriate comparison is not from one service to another in Montgomery County, but from Montgomery County services to services like them provided by other jurisdictions. This way we can better understand if “good” is good enough for Montgomery County service evaluations.

National Normative Database

NRC has been leading the strategic use of surveys for local governments since 1991, when the principals of the company wrote the first edition of what became the classic text on surveying citizens. In *Citizen Surveys: how to do them, how to use them, what they mean*, published by ICMA, we not only articulated the principles for quality survey methods, we pioneered both the idea of benchmark data for citizen opinion and the method for gathering benchmark data. We called it, “In Search of Standards,” and argued for the development and use of norms. “What has been missing from a local government’s analysis of its survey results is the context that school administrators can supply when they tell parents how an 80 percent score on the social studies test compares to test results from other school systems...”

NRC’s database of comparative resident opinion is comprised of resident perspectives obtained in citizen surveys from approximately 500 jurisdictions whose residents evaluated local government services. Typically, these surveys involve a sample of at least 400 residents in each jurisdiction; together, their opinions represent the views of over 30 million Americans. NRC has innovated a method for quantitatively integrating the results of surveys that we have conducted with those that others have conducted. We have described our integration methods thoroughly in *Public Administration Review*, *Journal of Policy Analysis and Management* and in our first book on conducting and using citizen surveys. Scholars who specialize in the analysis of citizen surveys regularly have relied on our work (e.g., Kelly, J. & Swindell, D. (2002). Service quality variation across urban space: First steps towards a model of citizen satisfaction, *Journal of Urban Affairs*, 24, 271-288.; Van Ryzin, G., Muzzio, D., Immerwahr, S., Gulick, L. & Martinez, E. (2004). Drivers and consequences of citizen

satisfaction: An application of the American Customer Satisfaction Index Model to New York City, *Public Administration Review*, 64, 331-341). The method described in those publications is refined regularly and statistically tested on a growing number of citizen surveys in our proprietary databases.

NRC's work on calculating national norms for resident opinions about service delivery and quality of life won the Samuel C. May award for research excellence from the Western Governmental Research Association.

The Role of Comparisons

Normative comparisons are used for benchmarking. Jurisdictions use the comparative information to help interpret their own citizen survey results, to create or revise community plans, to evaluate the success of policy or budget decisions, and to measure local government performance. We don't know what is small or tall without comparing. Taking the pulse of the community has little meaning without knowing what pulse rate is too high and what is too low. When surveys of service satisfaction turn up "good" citizen evaluations, we need to know how others rate their services to understand if "good" is good enough. Furthermore, in the absence of national or peer community comparisons, a jurisdiction is left with comparing its fire protection rating to its street maintenance rating. That comparison is unfair. Streets always lose to fire. We need to ask more important and meaningful questions. We need to know how residents' ratings of fire service compare to opinions about fire service in other communities.

A police department that provides the fastest and most efficient service in objective terms— one that closes most of its cases, solves most of its crimes, and keeps the crime rate low— still has a problem to fix if the residents in the community it intends to protect believe services are not very good compared to ratings that residents of other cities give to their own objectively "worse" departments.

The normative data can help that police department – or any city department – to understand how well citizens think it is doing. Without the comparative data, it would be like bowling in a tournament without knowing what the other teams are scoring. We recommend that citizen opinion be used in conjunction with other sources of information about budget, personnel, performance, and politics to help managers understand comparative results.

The jurisdictions in NRC's normative database are distributed geographically across the country and range from small to large in population size. Most commonly, comparisons have been made to the entire database, although comparisons can be made to subsets of jurisdictions (within a given region or population category). Despite the differences in jurisdiction characteristics, all are in the business of providing local government services to residents. Though the circumstances, resources, and practices of individual jurisdictions vary, the objective in every community is to provide services that are so timely, tailored, and effective that residents conclude the services are of the highest quality. High ratings in any jurisdiction, like high SAT scores in any teen household, bring pride and a sense of accomplishment.

Comparison of Montgomery County to the Normative Database

Montgomery County decided to compare its survey results – where feasible – with survey results from jurisdictions with a population of 500,000 or more. (Montgomery County’s population is about 953,000, according to the most recent estimate [for 2006].) There were 35 jurisdictions in NRC’s normative database with populations of 500,000 or more.¹ Normative comparisons have been provided when questions similar to one on the Montgomery County survey are included in NRC’s database and at least five of the jurisdictions in the County’s comparison group asked such questions.

Where comparisons are available, several numbers are provided in the tables on the following pages. The first is the rating given by respondents to the Montgomery County Resident Survey using the 100-point scale. The second is the ranking of Montgomery County’s rating in comparison to the jurisdictions where a similar question was asked. This is followed by the number of jurisdictions that asked a similar question. Next, the rank is expressed as a percentile to indicate its distance from the top score. For example, a rank of 5 (5th highest) out of 25 jurisdictions’ results translates to the 80th percentile. The percentile indicates the percentage of jurisdictions with identical or lower ratings. Therefore, a rating at the 80th percentile would mean that Montgomery County’s rating is equal to or better than 80 percent of the ratings from the other jurisdictions. Conversely, 20 percent of the jurisdictions where a similar question was asked had higher ratings.

Alongside the rank and percentile appears a comparison: “above norm,” “below norm” or “similar to norm.” This assessment of “above,” “below” or “similar to” comes from a statistical comparison of Montgomery County’s rating to the average rating from all the comparison jurisdictions where a similar question was asked (the “norm”). Differences of more than two points on the 100-point scale between Montgomery County’s ratings and the average based on the appropriate comparisons from the database are considered “statistically significant,” and thus are marked as “above” or “below” the norm. When differences between Montgomery County’s ratings and the norms are two points or less, they are marked as “similar to” the norm.

¹ All of these 35 jurisdictions were included in the County’s comparison group. Five of the six different aspects of quality of life assessed in the County's survey were available for comparison to jurisdictions in the County's comparison group of cities and counties 500,000 or larger. Those aspects rated above the average (the norm) for cities and counties in the comparison group that had asked similar questions were: Montgomery County as a place to live, one's neighborhood as a place to live, Montgomery County as a place to raise children, and overall quality of life in Montgomery County. Montgomery County as a place to retire was rated below the average.

A majority of the community characteristics assessed by Montgomery County were available for comparison. The characteristics rated above the norm for cities and counties with populations of 500,000 or more were: recreational opportunities, overall image or reputation of Montgomery County, opportunities to attend cultural activities, employment opportunities, and amount of public parking. The rating for air quality was similar to ratings given by residents in other large jurisdictions. Ease of bicycle travel in Montgomery County, availability of affordable health care, ease of car travel in Montgomery County, availability of affordable child care, and availability of affordable housing were rated below the norm in comparison to other larger cities and counties across the nation.
