SUBJECT: Bill 23-18, Fire Safety - Carbon Monoxide Alarm

PURPOSE: Introduction – no Council votes required

Bill 23-18, Fire Safety – Carbon Monoxide Alarm, sponsored by Lead Sponsor Councilmember Rice, is scheduled to be introduced on June 19, 2018. A public hearing is tentatively scheduled for July 10 at 1:30 p.m.

Bill 23-18 would require the owners of a single-unit, two-unit, and townhouse dwelling unit to install and maintain a carbon monoxide alarm.
