The County Council for Montgomery County, Maryland convened in the Council Hearing Room, Stella B. Werner Council Office Building, Rockville, Maryland at 9:02 A.M. on Tuesday, September 20, 2022.

The Council recessed at 9:23 A.M. and reconvened at 9:36 A.M.

GENERAL BUSINESS

A. Announcements - Agenda and Calendar Changes

Ms. Rupp, Clerk of the Council made the following announcement:

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(1) The Council is seeking applicants for a vacancy on the County's Policing Advisory Commission. The deadline to apply is Friday, September 30, 2022, at 5:00 P.M.

(2) B. Acknowledgement - Receipt of Petitions

Acknowledged receipt of petitions from residents of Montgomery County opposing the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance (IHRA) definition of antisemitism; and from residents of Montgomery County supporting **Bill 22-22**, Landlord-Tenant Relations - Limitations of Rent Increases.

C. **Action -** Approval of Minutes: April 19, June 14, 21, 28, and July 12 and 26, 2022

Approved the minutes without objection. Mr. Rice was temporarily absent.

(3) INTRODUCTION - WMATA General Manager and CEO: Randy Clarke

Mr. Clarke, who joined the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority (WMATA) in July 2022, discussed initiatives to improve safety and security, including the redeployment of police officers for higher visibility and the hiring of crisis intervention specialists; improve reliability of service, institute a deep-cleaning program, and reduce the current budget shortfall of approximately \$200 million. He noted the need to develop a strategic five-year plan to help ensure Metro's long-term success and to think regionally, not just jurisdictionally.

Councilmembers commented on the need for a high-performance partnership with Metro to reach racial equity and social justice, climate, and housing goals; to simplify the fare structure with an emphasis on those who rely on public transit; to grow ridership and focus on safety on trains, buses, and at stations; and for infrastructure improvements to help ensure reliable service to residents.

(4) **BRIEFING** - <u>Vision Zero</u>

Participating in the discussion were Mr. Holland, Vision Zero Coordinator, Office of the County Executive; Mr. Paylor, Division Chief, Division of Traffic Engineering and Operations, Department of Transportation (DOT); Assistant Chief Yamada, Field Services Bureau, and Captain Dillman, Director of Traffic Operations Division, Montgomery County Police Department (MCPD); Mr. Gunn, Acting District 3 Engineer, State Highway Administration (SHA); Ms. Cohn McGowan, Transportation Planner Coordinator, Montgomery County Planning Department; and Ms. Daphnis, Chair, Pedestrian, Bicycle, and Transportation Safety Advisory Committee.

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Received a briefing on roadway safety since the pandemic began, fatality rates and the number of serious and fatal crashes; steps being taken locally and nationally to address the increasing number of fatal crashes, including addressing substance abuse and more focused law enforcement on dangerous driving behaviors; the Vision Zero Action Plan and Work Plan; projects currently underway to improve pedestrian safety on both County and State roadways including bikeway and shared-use path projects; and enforcement of speed, red light, and stopped bus laws.

Requested a follow-up discussion on strategies to reach the County's multicultural populations, including partnerships with minority healthcare initiatives.

Councilmembers commented on the need to implement safety improvements quickly, additional efforts to stop drivers from passing stopped school buses, for additional speed and red-light cameras, and for other possible ways to improve pedestrian safety.

Mr. Katz, Chair of the Public Safety (PS) Committee, reviewed the purpose of the Bill and amendments approved in the Transportation and Environment (T&E) Committee, as contained in the staff report.

Legislative Attorney McCartney-Green noted a technical correction to the Bill to reflect the line number of the expanded definition of e-scooter.

Enacted draft #6 of **Bill 36-21** as amended and shown at the end of these minutes.

RECESS - Lunchtime meeting with Regional Services Center (RSC) Directors (Bethesda -Chevy Chase, East County, and Mid-County)

Participating in the discussion were Mr. Fosselman, Director, Bethesda-Chevy Chase RSC; Mr. Bandeh, Director, East County RSC; Ms. Cardona, Director, Mid-County RSC; Ms. Kassiri, Deputy Chief Administrative Officer; and Mr. Hartman, Director of Strategic Partnerships.

Received an update from Mr. Fosselman on the Pike District including construction at Rockville Pike and Old Georgetown Road, redevelopment of the White Flint metro area; University of Maryland Institute for Advanced Computing; pedestrian access at White Flint mall for parking; western workaround at Executive Boulevard; an update on Evolution Labs to be developed by Stone Ridge near the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center; the approval of the zoning text amendment to allow increased building height; marketing and placemaking; and stormwater management. Noted that the Pike District Partnership (currently the White Flint Downtown Advisory Committee) is

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working with the Office of Grants Management to disburse the \$300,000 business improvement grant funds.

Received an update on services provided by the East County RSC, noting the focus on four major developments: Hillandale Park, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA), the White Oak Shopping Center/Town Center, and the White Oak Apartments. Received information on the \$100,000 Business Improvement District Grant to the White Oak Partnership, a newly formed nonprofit to advise on public services and community activities that promote awareness and a sense of community. The East County Advisory Board continues to provide policy recommendations and advocacy for residents. The White Oak Master Plan is progressing with technical support to help the developers navigate permitting issues.

Received an update from Ms. Cardona on Mid-County issues, including an update on activities of the Wheaton Urban District Advisory Committee; the launching of meetings with small businesses; a meeting with the Salvadorean Consulate and the County's Business Advancement Team; and an introduction for microbusinesses on how to do business with the County, hosted by Impact Silver Spring. Received an update on events in the Arts and Entertainment District, the Wheaton Streetery; and on the need for increased security and trash removal in public spaces as more residents are increasingly using these areas.

Mr. Albornoz commented on the signed lease for operation of an East County Montgomery College location.

The Council recessed at 1:23 P.M. and reconvened at 1:34 P.M.

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(14) PUBLIC HEARING - Sectional Map Amendment (SMA) to implement the Approved and Adopted Silver Spring Downtown and Adjacent Communities Plan, SMA (H-146).

The public hearing was conducted. Additional material for the Council's consideration should be submitted by the close of business on September 27, 2022. A Planning, Housing, and Economic Development (PHED) Committee worksession is tentatively scheduled for October 3, 2022.

(14.5) PUBLIC HEARING/ACTION - Special Appropriation to the MCPS' FY23 Operating Budget - \$8,631,072 for the Maryland Leads Grant Program (Source of Funds: State Funds)

The public hearing was conducted and the record closed.

Adopted **Resolution 19-1388**, approving the subject Special Appropriation. Mr. Katz made the motion, which carried without objection among those present. Mr. Hucker, Mr. Jawando, Ms. Navarro, and Mr. Rice were temporarily absent. Later in the meeting, Mr. Hucker, Mr. Jawando, and Ms. Navarro noted that had they been present, they would have voted in the affirmative.

(7) DISTRICT COUNCIL SESSION

A. Worksession/Action - Zoning Text Amendment (ZTA) 22-04, Commercial Uses - Light Vehicle Sales and Rental (Indoor)

Participating in the discussion was Ms. Ndou, Legislative Attorney.

Mr. Riemer, Chair of the PHED Committee, summarized the purpose of the ZTA and Ms. Ndou reviewed the Committee's recommended amendments.

Enacted **Ordinance 19-32**, approving draft #2 of **ZTA 22-04**. The PHED Committee made the motion which carried among those present. Mr. Hucker and Mr. Rice were temporarily absent. Later in the meeting, Mr. Hucker indicated that had he been present, he would have voted in the affirmative.

B. Worksession/Action - Zoning Text Amendment (ZTA) 22-05, Signs

Participating in the discussion was Ms. Sokoni, Legislative Attorney.

Ms. Sokoni summarized the PHED Committee's recommended amendments to the ZTA.

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Enacted **Ordinance 19-33**, approving draft #2 of **ZTA 22-05**. The PHED Committee made the motion which carried among those present. Mr. Rice was temporarily absent.

C. Worksession/Action - Zoning Text Amendment (ZTA) 22-06, Exemptions - Historic Resources - Allowed Uses

Ms. Ndou participated in the discussion.

Ms. Ndou summarized the purpose of the ZTA and the impact it would have to individual historic properties operating eating and drinking establishments. She also reviewed the amendments proposed by the PHED Committee.

Enacted **Ordinance 19-34**, approving draft #2 of **ZTA 22-06**. The PHED Committee made the motion which carried among those present. Mr. Rice was temporarily absent.

(15) **REVIEW -** <u>Thrive 2050</u>

Participating in the discussion were Mr. Exantus, Managing Associate, CHPlanning and Nspiregreen; and Ms. Dunn, Senior Legislative Analyst.

Mr. Exantus provided recommendations to update the Thrive 2050 plan to further the equity efforts of developing the Plan. He presented several recommended changes to the Thrive 2050 Plan, such as establishing criteria to support Black owned business recruitment and retention; revisiting low-income and BIPOC communities to ensure communities can support the policies before passing the document; allow more time and resources to complete drafting Racial Equity and Social Justice (RESJ) review language; conducting a housing study that will seek to address displacement fears by community, determine how to achieve growth targets and identify barriers to successful implementation; and establish working relationships with communities that prioritize participatory planning and delegate power to vulnerable Communities. He also summarized recommendations pertaining to compact growth; complete communities; design, arts, and culture; housing; parks, recreation, and natural resources; and racial equity and social inclusion.

Noting that many of the recommendations provided by CHPlanning and Nspiregreen fall outside the Plan, Mr. Albornoz and Ms. Navarro requested that there is a connection made to and acknowledgement of other Council efforts and policy areas that may impact or be impacted by the Plan.

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Mr. Riemer also noted that the recommendations may be a best practice on public engagement and participation, and it should be reflected in the Plan to strengthen it.

Mr. Friedson noted that the original intent of this Plan was to be a broad scope of potential development, not prescriptive, and that Council should make a decision as to the intent of the Plan and be consistent throughout the document. He added that the Racial Equity and Social Justice chapter should be used to discuss implementation and community engagement.

Ms. Dunn reviewed the next steps for review of the Plan, including a memo from the Planning Department included in the staff report regarding a mapping of the recommendations to areas in the Plan that contain this information, as well as the plan to collect feedback from Councilmembers to edit the Plan.

Motion to Close

The Council adjourned the open session at 3:29 P.M. and reconvened in the Capital Crescent Trail Conference Room in closed session at 3:49 P.M. to 4:41 P.M. Mr. Glass made the motion, which carried unanimously among those present. Mr. Rice was temporarily absent.
