The County Council for Montgomery County, Maryland convened in the Council Hearing Room, Stella B. Werner Council Office Building, Rockville, Maryland at 9:04 a.m. on Tuesday, November 15, 2022.

PRESENTATIONS

A. Proclamation presented by Councilmember Rice recognizing Councilmember for a Day Winner Malaika Wande.

Mr. Albornoz announced that Ms. Navarro was attending the meeting virtually as a precaution after being exposed to COVID-19, and that Mr. Hucker was absent serving as part of a State Delegation participating in an international trip on economic development matters.

GENERAL BUSINESS

A. Announcements - Agenda and Calendar Changes

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Ms. Rupp, Clerk of the Council, announced additions to the agenda, introduction of **Expedited Bill 34-22**, Street and Roads - Classification of Roads; and introduction of Supplemental Appropriation #23-18 to the County Government's FY23 Operating Budget, Department of Transportation, Streets and Roads - Roadside Trees - Protection, \$60,750.

(1) B. Acknowledgement - Receipt of Petitions

No petitions were received this week.

C. **Action -** Approved the minutes from September 21, 2022, and the closed session minutes from October 18, 2022, without objection. Mr. Hucker was absent.

(2) WORKSESSION - <u>Bill 13-22</u>, <u>Buildings - Comprehensive Building</u>
<u>Decarbonization</u>

Participating in the discussion were Legislative Attorney Ndou; Mr. Bomer, Sustainability, Energy, and Mechanical Manager, Division of Commercial Building Construction, Department of Permitting Services (DPS); Mr. Fitzgerald, State Climate and Energy Policy Manager, and Ms. Shaw, Section Chief, Office of Energy and Climate, Department of Environmental Protection (DEP); Mr. Ellis, Regional Vice President, Governmental and External Affairs, PEPCO; and Mr. Washington, Director of Governmental and Legislative Affairs, Baltimore Gas and Electric.

Mr. Riemer, Chair of the Planning, Housing, and Economic Development (PHED) Committee, said the Bill focuses only on new construction to require the use of all electric energy. He reviewed the recommendations of the Committee noting that this is an incremental approach to move toward the exclusive use of non-fossil fuels. He acknowledged that this Bill would require the transformation of the electric grid and would require action at the federal, state, and local levels.

Mr. Jawando, a sponsor of the Bill, said the next Council would consider the issue of whether building renovations and rehabs should be required to switch to electric power.

Mr. Rice commented on the affordability issue and urged the Council to consider unforeseen consequences and to be mindful of the Bill's impact on lower-income households in the County, noting the importance of developing a strategy with - 3 - 11/15/2022

regard to who will pay for improvements, noting the impact on communities of color.

Reviewed issues associated with the Bill including measures taken by other jurisdictions, including the District of Columbia; concerns whether the current electric grid could handle increased electrification of buildings, and the impact on construction of affordable housing.

Received comments from Mr. Ellis that a study is underway by the Public Services Commission on needed improvements to the grid and associated infrastructure in order to supply energy to all-electric buildings. Noted that questions include how additional electric capacity would be fueled, how quickly additional capacity could be built, whether the use of heat pumps will help energy consumption, affordability and equity issues, scope of analysis; and how checkins are built in to ensure progress is being made toward meeting energy goals.

(3) **Introduction of Bills:**

A. <u>Expedited Bill 32-22</u>, Department of Health and Human Services - Structure and Positions

Introduced draft #1 of **Expedited Bill 32-22**, sponsored by the Council President at the request of the County Executive. A public hearing is scheduled for January 17, 2023, at 1:30 p.m.

B. <u>Bill 33-22</u>, Capital Improvements Program - Affordable Housing Feasibility Study - Required

Introduced draft #5 of **Bill 33-22**, sponsored by Councilmember Friedson. A public hearing will be scheduled at a later date. Councilmembers Navarro, Riemer, Katz, Rice, and Albornoz requested to be added as cosponsors.

C. Expedited Bill 34-22, Streets and Roads - Classification of Roads

Introduced draft #1 of **Expedited Bill 34-22**, sponsored by the Council President. A public hearing is scheduled for December 6, 2022, at 1:30 p.m.

(4) Call of Bills for Final Reading:

A. Bill 27-22, Administration - Inspector General - Powers and Duties

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Senior Legislative Attorney Wellons reviewed the purpose of the Bill, which will update and clarify the powers and duties of the Inspector General.

Enacted draft #1 of Bill 27-22, as introduced.

Ms. Navarro made the motion and the Bill was enacted by a roll call vote:

YEAS: Katz, Jawando, Riemer, Navarro, Rice, Friedson, Glass, Albornoz ABSENT: Hucker.

B. Expedited Bill 21-22, Weapons - Firearms in or Near Places of Public Assembly

Mr. Katz, Chair of the Public Safety (PS) Committee, reviewed the recommendation of the Committee as contained in the staff packet. He noted this bill is in response to the Supreme Court's decision earlier this year which eliminated "just cause" requirements for wear-and-carry handgun licenses.

Councilmembers commented on the need for additional federal measures to allow local jurisdictions more discretion to help keep residents safe.

Enacted draft #2 of **Bill 21-22**, as shown at the end of these minutes.

The PS Committee made the motion and the Bill was enacted by a roll call vote:

YEAS: Katz, Jawando, Riemer, Navarro, Rice, Friedson, Glass, Albornoz ABSENT: Hucker.

C. <u>Bill 39-21</u>, Taxation - Public Safety Officers - Public Safety Emergency Communications Specialists - Property Tax Credit - Established

Mr. Katz summarized the purpose of the Bill and reviewed the recommendation of the joint PS and Government Operations and Fiscal Policy (GO) Committee, as contained in the staff report.

Mr. Albornoz noted the importance of having first responders live in the communities they serve and urged the General Assembly to look at creative ways to provide similar incentives to other first responders, teachers, and nurses.

Enacted draft #5 of Bill 39-21, as shown at the end of these minutes.

The PS/GO Committee made the motion and the Bill was enacted by a roll call vote:

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YEAS: Katz, Jawando, Riemer, Navarro, Rice, Friedson, Glass, Albornoz ABSENT: Hucker.

Interviewed Ms. Anderson for the position of Director of the Office of Human Resources.

Participating in the discussion was Senior Legislative Attorney Wellons and Ms. Wenger, Director, Office of Intergovernmental Relations (OIR); Mr. Conklin, Director, Department of Transportation (DOT); and Ms. Herrera, Director, Office of Broadband Programs, Technology and Enterprise Business Solutions (TEBS).

Reviewed the draft letter of the Council's priorities prepared by OIR for the State Delegation.

Defeated Mr. Jawando's motion to add the following language that was included in the 2022 State Priorities letter regarding Local Authority, to the 2023 priorities letter:

Expanding the County's authority and flexibility to enact local legislation when necessary to address County priorities that are not fully addressed at the State level, including increasing County flexibility to raise revenue and have local control for property tax classification.

YEAS: Jawando, Rice, Glass

NAYS: Katz, Friedson, Navarro Katz

ABSTAIN: Albornoz ABSENT: Hucker

Approved without objection Mr. Rice's to change in the Broadband Accessibility and Affordability section the word "urban" to the phrase all underserved areas including both rural and urban.

Approved without objection Mr. Rice's motion to replace the term "digital literacy" with "digital skills".

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Supported Mr. Rice's motion to approve the State Priorities Letter for the State Delegation, as amended. Mr. Hucker was absent.

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Adopted **Resolution 19-1455**, appointing Dr. Kisha Davis as the County Health Officer. Mr. Rice made the motion which carried without objection. Mr. Hucker was absent.

(18) ACTION - Director, Office of Human Resources: Traci Anderson

Adopted **Resolution 19-1454**, appointing Traci Anderson as the Director of the Office of Human Resources. Mr. Jawando made the motion which carried without objection. Mr. Hucker was absent.

(6) WORKSESSION/ACTION - Resolution to amend Council Rules of Procedure

Participating in the discussion were Ms. Sokoni and Mrs. McCartney-Green, Legislative Attorneys.

Reviewed the proposed amendments to the Council Rules of Procedures.

Supported Mr. Jawando's motion to remove the proposed language from Rule 5(b) as follows:

Attendance. A Councilmember is expected to attend meetings in person. A Councilmember may request the option to participate in meetings remotely by means of virtual or telephonic conference, although the use of such alternative means must be limited to circumstances when a Councilmember's in-person attendance would be impractical or unreasonable. [[A decision about whether a Councilmember's physical presence at a meeting is considered impractical or unreasonable would be in the President's discretion and made on a case-by-case basis. (Amendments to Rule 5(b)).]]

Mr. Albornoz, Mr. Glass, and Mr. Friedson were opposed.

Supported without objection Mr. Glass's motion to amend Rule 5(b) attendance, to require that when Councilmembers participate remotely, the meeting minutes should reflect their form of presence.

Supported without objection Mr. Katz's motion to add clarifying language to reflect that individual Councilmembers may create a group to advise them on specific issue and is excluded from the definition of a "group" in Rule 1(c).

Supported without objection, staff recommendations to clarify Rule 1(d) regarding closed meeting attendance reporting and confidentiality requirements, as contained on page four of the staff report.

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Supported without objection, Mr. Friedson's motion to amend Rule 1(i) to require that if a Council or committee meeting takes place in person, the meeting must be presided by a Councilmember in-person.

Supported without objection, the staff recommended changes to Rule 4 and 4(b) to require that public hearings and notice of emergency matters are also published online, as contained on page five of the staff report.

Supported without objection, the staff recommendations to amend Rule 6(e) to allow the President to provide electronic copies of bills, as contained on pages five and six of the staff report.

Supported without objection, the staff recommended changes to Rule 6 to clarify the requirements for the publication of bill amendments, as contained on page six of the staff report.

Supported without objection, the staff recommended changes to Rule 4 regarding the advance notice of public hearings and Board of Health public hearings, as contained on page six of the staff report.

Supported without objection the staff recommended changes to Rule 7(e) that dictates that a resolution will expire 180 days after it is introduced, as contained on page six of the staff report.

Defeated Mr. Glass's motion to require that legislation expires if not acted on before the end of a Council's term. Mr. Friedson, Mr. Glass, and Mr. Katz voted in favor of the amendment.

Supported without objection, the staff recommended changes to Rule 9(c) regarding ceding time, as contained on page seven of the staff report.

Supported without objection, the staff recommended changes to Rule 9(g) requiring a transcript of a Council meeting only when required by law, as contained on page six of the staff report.

Supported without objection, the staff recommended changes to Rule 5 to require a submission of a written draft and at least an eight-day advance notice of the introduction of an agenda item to the President, as contained on page seven and eight of the staff report.

Supported without objection, Mr. Friedson's motion to amend Rule 1 to require that the Council President must have support of at least a majority of Councilmembers to send correspondence in their capacity as Council President and must note whether such correspondence is on behalf of a majority of the body or as the Council's unanimous view. Councilmembers may individually or jointly

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send correspondence in their individual capacities and may include their title(s), but must clearly note they are not speaking on behalf of the body.

Defeated Mr. Glass's motion to amend Rule 7, to increase the minimum number of Councilmembers in support of the introduction of a special appropriation from three to four Councilmembers. Mr. Albornoz, Mr. Glass, Mr. Friedson, and Mr. Riemer voted in favor of the amendment.

Supported Mr. Katz's motion to require the support of three Councilmembers to be in support of a special appropriation in order for it to be introduced by the sponsor, as contained on page nine of the staff report.

Mr. Friedson suggested that a policy needs to be established to review special appropriations by the Government Operations and Fiscal Policy (GOFP) Committee and the appropriate oversight committee before action is taken by the Council.

Supported without objection, December 5, 2022, as the effective dates.

Adopted **Resolution 19-1443**, approving the Council Rules of Procedure as amended. Mr. Katz made the motion which carried without objection. Mr. Hucker was absent.

Motion to Close

The Council adjourned the open session at 5:18 p.m. and reconvened in the Capital Crescent Trail Conference Room in closed session from 5:25 p.m. to 6:35 p.m. Mr. Jawando made the motion, which carried unanimously among those present.
