(2) **Introduction of Bills:**

A. Bill 18-23, Structure of County Government - Community Zoning and Land Use Resource Office

Introduced draft #1 of the subject Bill, sponsored by Councilmember Friedson. A public hearing is scheduled for April 18, 2023, at 1:30 p.m. Ms. Luedtke requested to be added as a co-sponsor of the Bill.

Supported without objection Mr. Katz's motion to change the word "Elderly" to the words "65 and above" in the title of the Bill. Ms. Fani-González was temporarily absent.

Mr. Jawando, noting that the GO Committee declined to support his amendment to reduce the eligibility for this property tax credit from 40 to 20 years of County residency, said a comprehensive review is needed of how to develop an equitable way to provide property tax credits or relief for senior County residents.

Ms. Mink commented that people who rent homes in the County are also looking to age in place as renters, and work is needed to expand equity as a disproportionate number of renters are African American.

B. <u>Bill 7-23</u>, Consumer Protection - Gasoline Station Signage

Mr. Albornoz, sponsor of **Bill 7-23**, reviewed the purpose of the Bill, and Senior Legislative Attorney Wellons reviewed the recommendations of the joint Public Safety (PS) and Economic Development (ECON) Committee, as contained in the staff report.

Supported without objection Mr. Friedson's motion to amend lines 25 to 33 of the Bill to allow for a separate sign, visible to motorists, displaying the credit price in the same size and font as the standard sign, with this amendment to sunset in seven years. Ms. Fani-González was temporarily absent.

Mr. Friedson encouraged Executive Branch staff to work with the State regulators to make sure small business owners are aware of the sign requirement.

AN ACT to:

(1) amend the property tax credit for certain [[elderly]] individuals <u>65 and above</u> and retired military services members; and

(2) generally amend the law regarding property tax credits.

By amending

Montgomery County Code Chapter 52, Taxation

Section 52-110, Property Tax Credit – Elderly Individuals and Retired Military Services Members.

The County Council for Montgomery County, Maryland approves the following Act:

- 15 - 3/28/2023

Sec. 1. Section 52-110 is amended as follows:

52-110. Property tax credit -- [[elderly]] individuals <u>65 and above</u> and retired military services members.

* * *

- (c) Eligibility. An individual is eligible to receive a property tax credit if:
 - (1) (A) the individual is at least 65 years old;
 - (B) the individual has lived in the same dwelling for at least the preceding 40 years; and

A merchant must not engage in a deceptive, unfair, or unconscionable trade practice, whether or not any specific consumer has, in fact, been misled, deceived, or damaged thereby. Deceptive, unfair, or unconscionable trade practices include:

* * *

- (y) taking payment for goods or services without delivering the goods or performing the services; [or] or
- (z) practicing, or in any way engaging in, any trade, occupation, or profession without a license, registration, certificate, or other evidence of training or experience required by law[[; or
- (aa) <u>a violation of Section 11-4C]</u>].

<u>11-4C. Gasoline Stations – Accurate Signage Required.</u>

- (a) For purposes of this section, the following terms have the meanings indicated.
 - (1) Business Regulation Article means the Business Regulation
 Article of the Maryland Code, as amended.
 - (2) <u>Credit price</u> means the <u>highest total amount</u>, including any fees, payable to a gas station by a customer using a credit card or other non-cash form of payment, for one whole measurement unit of regular gasoline sold on the premises.
 - (3) Gasoline station means a merchant who sells motor fuel at retail under Section 10-315 of the Business Regulation Article.

(b) A gasoline station must:

(1) comply with Section 10-315 of the Business Regulation Article; and

- (2) if the gas station posts a sign under Section 10-315(e) of the Business Regulation Article, include within the sign additional pricing information required under subsection (c) of this Section.
- (c) A sign posted by a gas station under Section 10-315(e)(2) of the Business Regulation Article must include[[, clearly and visibly,]] the [[highest]] credit price.
- (d) If the lowest price under the Business Regulation Article and the credit price are the same, subsection (c) does not apply.
- (e) <u>Alternative method of compliance subject to sunset.</u>
 - (1) This subsection must sunset and must have no further effect 7 years after this Section takes effect.
 - (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of this Section, a gas station may satisfy the requirements of subsections (b) and (c) of this Section if it posts, on a sign visible to motorists and separate from the sign required under Section 10-315(e) of the Business Regulation Article, the credit price.
 - (3) If a gas station posts the credit price under paragraph (2) of this subsection, the letters and numerals on the separate sign must appear in the same size and font as those used on the sign posted under Section 10-315(e) of the Business Regulation Article.
- Sec. 2. Effective Date. This Act must take effect 6 months after it becomes law.
- Sec. 3. Limited Sunset. Subsection (e) of Section 11-4C, added under Section 1 of this Act, must sunset and must have no further effect 7 years after this Act takes effect.
