The County Council for Montgomery County, Maryland convened in the Council Hearing Room, Stella B. Werner Council Office Building, Rockville, Maryland at 9:02 a.m. on Tuesday, April 11, 2023.

PRESENTATIONS

- A. Proclamation was presented by Councilmembers Katz and Albornoz recognizing Child Abuse Prevention Month.
- B. Proclamation was presented by Councilmember Albornoz recognizing National Public Health Week.

GENERAL BUSINESS

- A. **Announcements -** Ms. Rupp, Clerk of the Council, announced that the resolution to appoint Special Projects Manager in the Office of the County Executive was deleted from the agenda.
- B. **Action -** Approval of Minutes

Approved the minutes of February 9, 27, 28, and March 7, 13, and 14, 2023, without objection. Mr. Jawando was temporarily absent.

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(1) **BRIEFING** - FY23-28 Capital Improvements Program (CIP) Status Update

Participating in the discussion were Senior Legislative Analyst McGuire, Senior Legislative Analyst Levchenko, Legislative Analyst Mia, and Senior Analyst Orlin.

Received a status update on the affordability of the amended FY23-28 CIP, including changes in anticipated revenues and project amendments considered by the Council's committees to date. Noted projected reduced recordation tax revenue and that the six-year gap in the CIP has increased to \$207.5 million. The most recent reductions put forth by the County Executive are reflected in the staff packet and additional amendments are likely to be received.

Ms. Luedtke expressed concern that this budget assumes a \$145 million structural deficit in FY25, and about the unrealistic nature of the operating budget submitted by the County Executive.

Ms. Mink requested Council staff provide CIP options both with and without the proposed increase in the recordation tax. Staff agreed to provide information for the Government Operations and Fiscal Policy (GO) Committee meeting on April 24.

Mr. Jawando received confirmation that the gap, particularly for Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) and Montgomery College, is due mainly to cost increases, not new projects, and requested staff quantify a breakdown of new projects and projects with cost increases. Dr. Orlin noted that when the design process for transportation projects is completed, costs will be higher. Mr. Jawando said the Council needs to discuss how long the structural deficit would be allowed to continue.

Mr. Albornoz commented that the County has been aggressive with CIP projects during the past 16 years, and that ways to expand economic development and the tax base need to be explored.

(2) **BRIEFING** - FY24 Budget Overview

Participating in the discussion were Ms. Michaelson, Council Executive Director; Mr. Howard, Deputy Director; Ms. Singleton, Racial Equity Manager; Ms. Bryant, Director, Office of Management and Budget; and Mr. Coveyou, Director, Department of Finance.

Received an overview of the County Executive's proposed FY24 Operating Budget, budget context, Council staff's concerns regarding sustainability, and the Council President's approach to reviewing the budget. Noted that the proposed budget includes a 10 percent property tax increase and expressed concern about

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the use of reserve funds for ongoing expenditures, which is not consistent with the Council's adopted fiscal policies on the use of reserves and creates an estimated structural deficit of \$145 million in FY25. Reviewed estimated revenues, staffing changes, proposed pay adjustments, and noted the racial equity tool developed to determine how the recommended operating and capital budgets promote racial equity and social justice.

Mr. Glass noted that President Biden ended the COVID-19 national emergency yesterday and requested Department of Finance staff provide an estimate of the amount of County dollars used to continue federal COVID programs.

Received information from Council staff on the decision points, timelines, and votes needed on various budget-related issues, including revenue and expenditure proposals and the Income Tax Offset Credit (ITOC). Noted that the County Executive's proposed operating budget is \$363 million over the aggregate operating budget established by the Council in February.

Mr. Friedson requested information on the ITOC revenue impact from those property owners who are no longer eligible for the ITOC, and asked Council staff to confirm the information.

Councilmembers expressed concern about the use of one-time funds for ongoing programs, the assumed structural deficit in following years, vacancies and staffing issues; and the need to expand the tax base moving forward.

Mr. Jawando expressed the view that the Council needs more dedicated time to review the budget; he noted that the proposed property tax increase does not provide adequate revenue to meet Montgomery County Public Schools' (MCPS) budget request; and noted compensation increases are a significant factor in the budget, with work to be done regarding the restructuring of government.

Mr. Glass requested budget updates in six months to see how the hiring process for filling County-wide vacancies and newly funded program implementations are progressing.

WORKSESSION - FY23-28 Capital Improvements Program (CIP)

Mr. Jawando, Chair of the Education and Culture (EC) Committee, highlighted the success of the library "refresh" program, and reviewed the status of library CIP projects, as contained in the staff report. Legislative Analyst Chen noted that the Noyes Library is also being considered today but was inadvertently omitted from the agenda.

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Ms. Vassallo, Director, Public Libraries; and Mr. Dise, Director, and Mr. Ossont, Deputy Director, Department of General Services (DGS), participated in the discussion.

Ms. Mink, who did not participate in the Committee's discussion due to illness, indicated she supports the recommendations of the Committee.

(3) Library Refurbishment Level of Effort

Approved the subject CIP, without objection.

(4) Chevy Chase Library and Redevelopment

Mr. Ossont noted three options under consideration for the Chevy Chase Library and that a summary of these options would be presented to the Council this summer. Mr. Friedson expressed concern about the project's delay and the mixed messages concerning the proposed redevelopment that are causing confusion amongst the public. Mr. Dise indicated they want to maximize use of the site, but costs are a challenging factor for adding affordable housing and a childcare facility at the location. Ms. Mink expressed her support for the co-location of affordable housing at library sites, and commented on the need to keep libraries fully staffed as they provide important services to the community. Ms. Balcombe commented on the need for the Council to make assessments swiftly on library projects given their importance to the community.

Approved the subject CIP, as submitted by the County Executive.

(5) <u>Clarksburg Library</u>

Mr. Jawando requested a status update on the Clarksburg Library later this summer.

Approved the subject CIP, as submitted by the County Executive.

(6) 21st Century Library Enhancement Level of Effort

Approved the subject CIP, as submitted by the County Executive.

Approved the subject CIP for the Noyes Library for Young Children, as submitted by the County Executive.

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(7) Wheaton Arts and Cultural Center

Ms. Chen reviewed the recommendation of the EC Committee, as contained in the staff report. Noted that a resolution concerning a FY23 supplemental appropriation of \$75,000 to allow the County's affordable housing partner to submit a Low-Income Housing Tax Credit Application in late spring 2023 will be considered by the Council on April 25, 2023. Noted the EC Committee's support for affordable housing at the Wheaton Arts and Cultural Center at 11507 Georgia Avenue in Wheaton.

Approved the subject CIP, as submitted by the County Executive.

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Mr. Friedson, sponsor of the legislation, commented that this is a bijurisdictional effort with the District of Columbia to support placemaking and a vibrant, transit-oriented business community on both sides of Western Avenue.

County Council for Montgomery County, Maryland, approves the following act:

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1	Sec 1. Sections <u>68A-1</u> , 68A-3, 68A-4, 68A-5, and 68A-8 are amended as

3	68A-1. Definitions.

- For purposes of this Chapter, the following terms have the meanings indicated:
 - (a) *Board of directors* means the board of directors of an urban district corporation.
 - (b) <u>Class 1 property</u> means real property used or intended to be used for residential use categories under Chapter 59.
 - (c) <u>Class 2 property</u> means real property used or intended to be used for commercial or industrial use categories under Chapter 59.
 - [[(b)]] (d) Corporation means an urban district corporation.

- [[(c)]] (e) Department means a County department, principal office, or other office that the County Executive designates to perform functions under this Chapter. Department does not include an urban district corporation.
 - [[(d)]] (f) Maintaining streetscape amenities means cleaning, repairing rehabilitating, or replacing streetscape amenities.
 - [[(e)]] (g) Maintaining the streetscape includes cleaning sidewalks, driveways, streets, and other public areas; collecting trash; and caring for trees and other plantings. Maintaining the streetscape includes streetscaping of the medians and street sweeping, but does not include maintaining the road or the curbs.
 - [[(f)]] (h) Off-site amenity means a streetscape amenity installed by an optional method developer on a public right-of-way.
- [[(g)]] (i) On-site amenity means a streetscape amenity installed by an optional method developer on property owned by the optional method

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developer or on private property not owned by an optional method developer.

- [[(h)]] (j) Optional method development means property for which the owner has agreed with the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission to be responsible for installing and maintaining both on-site and off-site improvements.
- [[(i)]] (k) Streetscape amenity includes such items as bulletin boards and electronic displays; communication systems; containers for growing things; fountains and pools; drinking fountains; functional and decorative lighting; outdoor seating; restrooms; seating and other street furniture; shelters for pedestrians and persons using public transportation; non-standard paving; sidewalks; trees and other plantings; trash containers; vending booths and kiosks; works of art; any outdoor item that an optional method developer agreed to install and maintain as a condition of site plan approval; and other items of a similar character or purpose.
- [[(j)]] (1) Urban district corporation means a corporation created under Section 68A-9.

68A-3. Creation of urban districts; purposes.

- (a) Urban districts are created in the business districts of Wheaton, Bethesda,
 [and] Silver Spring, and Friendship Heights as described in Section 68A 8.
