**Welcome**: The meeting was called to order at 7:09 p.m.

**Community Introductions:** Guests and members of the community introduced themselves and a few made comments on community issues. Fatmata Barrie, Councilmember Will Jawando's office and Brian Anleu, Councilmember Tom Hucker's office were introduced by Jewru Bandeh.

**Approval of the January 2, 2018 Meeting Summary**: A motion was made to approve the January 2, 2018 summary. The motion was seconded and unanimously approved.

Presentation by Special Guests: A presentation was made by Rogers Stanley, Chief of Neighborhood Revitalization; Catherine Mahmud and Kristina Ellis, Senior Planning Specialists, Montgomery County Dept. of Housing and Community Affairs; and Brandon Bedford, Research, Planning & Policy Analyst, Montgomery County Economic Development Corporation. Topic of discussion was: Montgomery County Economic Opportunity Zones and Façade Improvement Programs.

# Catherine Mahmud – Burtonsville and Colesville Revitalization Façade Improvement Programs

- Assisted property owners in Burtonsville, including Chapala and Domino's Pizza restaurants to improve appearance
- Commercial Revitalization Program Demolition and replacement of five dated and worn pylon business signs, including Seibel's Restaurant
  - Possible future projects in Burtonsville Mattress Discounters/Bedding Barn and Animal Hospital
- Burtonsville Gateway Signage is being explored

• Colesville project was completed. There is a new project at Meadowood Center on New Hampshire Avenue.

Catherine Mahmud answered questions/comments from the board and community regarding:

- Incentives offered besides cash
- 15-year easement
- Consideration for partnering with service providers to improve cell service
- Property owner's capacity to qualify
- The Burtonsville fuel building
- Improving safety along Route198?
- Revitalization of the Burtonsville Crossing Shopping Center?

#### Presenter Kristina Ellis – Montgomery County Opportunity Zones (OZ)

- Opportunity Zones Programs is new program at the Federal level
- Idea is to target low-income census tracts to invest in to spur economic activity
- 15 key geographical tract areas submitted for OZ consideration
- Most of what was suggested was accepted by the governor—now have 14 OZs
- Only 11% of country is considered OZ
- 3 different stages of tax credit benefits/investor tax incentives
- OZ locations include: Silver Spring Central Business District, Wheaton Central Business District, White Oak, Germantown, Montgomery Village, Parts of Gaithersburg, Parts of Long Branch and Takoma Park, Part of Rockville Pike
- Provided additional resources

# Presenter Brandon Bedford - Opportunity Zones in General

- OZ's are more focused on private sector investments
- Completed two workshops recently
- Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond has been instrumental in helping to make connections

Brandon Bedford answered questions from the board and community relative to:

- OZ designation by real estate or based on geography
- OZs as census driven
- Establishment of OZ regulations
- Enclave eligibility for OZ designation

- Presenter thanked community member for tuning in to live stream of presentation.

- Community member statement on the County's Subdivision Staging Policy as related to the White Oak Planning Areas

#### **Updates/Reports:**

Chair of the Planning and Economic Development and Quality of Life/Services Committees, Bill Bentley – Last committee meeting was cancelled for the FY20 Operating Budget meeting, which went well.

## East County Regional Services Office Director's report covered:

- The Annual Board Survey needing all members to complete
- o Need for broad attendance at the next ECCAB committee (FY20 Budget) meeting
- Construction on government lots (Park and Ride entrance and Regional Center lot)
- Working with Home2 Suites to do a recruitment fair.
- o White Oak Medical Center will open August 25, 2019
- Working with the Department of Health and Human Services on a national search for a job development services provider under the East County Opportunity Zone initiative
- 100% inspection completed for Enclave apartments completed (includes 2,000+ notices of violations); management has hired additional maintenance workers, Renters Alliance is helping form a Renters Association.

# **Police Department**

# Commander Montgomery, 3D

Double homicide on Steward Lane reported and suspects are apprehended and being charged. 4<sup>th</sup> District Report highlights included:

- The shooting at Wheaton Plaza on Nov 18, 2018 is now solved
- There are a slew of crimes targeting Latino taxi drivers
- There was vandalism at the mosque on Briggs Chaney Rd—the police worked with them to increase security with cameras
- There was a murder in the Wheaton area whereby a son killed his mother
- There are many parking complaints, especially on the New Hampshire Avenue corridor.
   Call the non-emergency phone number first (301-279-8000) and report on Next Door later highly encouraged

The police department addressed comments and questions from the community:

- People are driving with expired tags.
- Abandoned vehicles on streets.
- Ethnically related vandalism on the mosque

# **County Council Offices:**

#### **Councilmember Tom Hucker's Office**

- Councilman Hucker passed the bill on lead levels in drinking water— 86 of 200 school had levels higher than allowance.
- Meeting will be on the February 26, 2019.
- State Legislature mandated the tests for the school. MCPS spent about \$500,000 just to complete testing.
- Still trying to get hands around the schools and will seek to address other public buildings. Washington, DC is already at 5-parts-per-billion and going down to 1-part-perbillion.
- Working on Enclave issues.

#### Councilmember Will Jawando's Office

Councilmember Jawando introduced his very first bill on Jan 15, 2019: In the case of
police shooting that results in a death, there is an outside agency that brings findings
back to the county. Open to public to sign up to testify.

#### New Business: Discussion/ECCAB Recommendations - FY20 Operating Budget Priorities

Chair Christopher Bolton – Opened the floor to board members to discuss priorities for the Executive letter. Topics and Issues discussed included:

- Economic Development, maintain grants that are alive for events like White Oak signage, grants for Bus Rapid Transit System implementation
- White Oak Transit Center modernization of it, maintaining Galway/Greencastle summer programs
- Creating a sense of community/place in White Oak with marketing and signage
- Availability of summer programs that are affordable and available (9am-6pm and over the full 12 weeks of summer)
- General transportation programs including bike paths
- Community based Workforce Development programs with wrap around supports in East County, including medical pathways training for the White Oak Medical Center skills training for adults as well as students
- Maintain senior programming at recreation centers
- Stronger mental health services
- Review/follow up on what has been accepted from our past letters to the County Executive
- Stick with/keep 5-6 key themes (priority areas).
