Delayed notifications to voters that Mail In Ballots were returned to BOE

Key observations

MoCo voters embraced Mail in Voting.

Space is in demand.

Generational shift in election workforce.

Montgomery County voters prefer online options.

Change is inevitable for BOE and its team.

Candidate filing, ballot proofing, and ballot order

Candidate Filing:

- Candidate filing began February 2021
- Deadline extended to April 15, 2022
- 206 candidates filed
- There were no Write-In candidates for local offices

Ballot Proofing:

- Proofing of 258 precinct level ballot styles
- Proofing of both English and Spanish versions of the ballots (print and audio)

Ballot order

- The general ballot order consisted of 1.07 million ballots
- With a three-page ballot, this equates to 3.21 million pieces of paper
- Order delivered on 64 pallets








Turnout 2022 Cycle – MD counties






Mail In Ballots – volume across MD Counties





Montgomery County voters submitted 115,751 Mail In Ballot applications as per SBE data for 2022 Primary Election.






2022 GP MIB Requests – Received Method




2022 GG MIB Requests – Received Method




Party breakdown of MIB requests






Permanent vs election specific MIB requests











Mail vs Web – comparison of GP vs GG







Received requests for web delivery of MIBs in 2022 GG




MIBs – distribution of requests per age group

Distribution of MIB APPs per age groups in 2022 GG






MIB REQUESTS PER AGE GROUP




MIBs – permanent requests Mail vs Web






Permanent MIBs request – party breakdown






2022 GG Permanent MIB Requests - Party breakdown









2022 GG: How were Mail In Ballots returned?








Multiple locations were utilized due to

In 2022 General Election Canvass was conducted at three locations:


- Montgomery County Board of Elections, (four canvass days)

Canvass locations – 2022 GG




Canvass days – canvassers and volume


Overview – issue reasons

- ☐ The main reason codes (out of 12 available) identified by Provisional Election Judges were:
- 1. Not on a precinct register
- 2. Change of address
- 3. Change of party affiliation
- 4. Listed as Absentee or already voted
- 11. Not pre-qualified for Same Day Registration






Provisional Code 4 – method of MIB delivery




Provisionals Code 4 – Party Breakdown



Recruitment

ELECTION JUDGES RECRUITMENT

Poll workers in early voting centers and polling places, canvass workers, Drop Box attendants, and support for the Nursing Home Program.

In conjunction with the Outreach Program, recruiters used multiple methods to generate interest which resulted in accepting 6,507 applications.

Satisfactory number of applicants did not translate to a sufficient number of trained Election Judges to meet planned allocation on Election Day.

ELECTION JUDGE TRAINING PROGRAM

Training for this election was initially provided in three stages.

Stage I – Online Quiz.

Stage II – Online Training Module.

Stage III – Hands-On Training.

ONLINE QUIZ

Applicants are required to read Chapters 1 through 4 of the Election Worker Manual and complete the quiz.

3,677 applicants completed the quiz

3,533 applicants passed the quiz

144 applicants failed the quiz




Election workers per party




2022 General - Election Day

Number of precincts reporting wait time per hour





ELECTION NIGHT REPORTING


The Early Voting results and the MIB results tabulated by Election Day were posted on SBE's website at 8 PM.

For this election, Montgomery County used seven regional sites. Six of the sites were located throughout the county and the BOE location was the main site.

By 11:00 PM 96.5% of the Election Day results were received and uploaded which is equivalent to 223 out of 231 precincts.

The results for the remaining eight precincts were received by 12:30 AM.








Incoming phone calls









Incoming phone calls – duration
