The Commission on Veterans Affairs is pleased to present a summary of its activities for the past year. We continue to advise and consult with you on issues of concern to the estimated 46,000 veterans, and their families, who live in the County. Under your leadership and with your support, the Commission is mandated to research, assemble, analyze and disseminate information that will assist in meeting the needs of veterans and their families. The Commissioners bring knowledge and expertise to the County by providing valuable input and advice on issues affecting our veterans.

We are working to increase access in the County to health care for veterans. The County needs to encourage veterans and their families to enroll them in the VA health care system and we ask that information be provided on County Ride On buses as to how to enroll. The County needs to continue to press to build more collaborative relationships with the VA Medical Center in D.C., with the ultimate goal of establishing a Community Based Outpatient Clinic in the county. In the interim the County should ask the DCVAMC to have increased bus service and shuttles to Montgomery County.

The Commission is working to increase outreach to the general veteran population regarding programs, services and recognition events; and this includes supporting veterans at Montgomery College and the Universities at Shady Grove. We are working to increase VA presence in the county. The Commission achieved a major goal in having a full-time Veterans Service Officer funded by the Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs stationed at Montgomery College to help veterans with their benefits. We continue to encourage cooperation, coordination and collaboration among all agencies and non-profits that serve veterans so that everyone works together to provide the best services possible to veterans and their families. We have focused on identifying veterans and their family members, on recognition of active military and veterans and particularly those who have made the ultimate sacrifice for our great nation. The new hiring preference for disabled veterans and veterans has led to the hiring of 98 veterans including four disabled veterans. We were pleased to be part of the dedication of Memorial Plaza and that you have designated "2015 as the Year of Montgomery County's Veterans and Their Families."

We wish to recognize and give our personal thanks to all Commissioners, the many community members, and the agency staff who participate in our meetings for their commitment and dedication. We would like to acknowledge DHHS Director Uma Ahluwalia for her role in meeting with the Boards, Commissions and Committees to keep us informed of important health and human services issues, Dr. Jay Kenney, Chief, Aging and Disability Service, Betsy Luecking, Staff Liaison, and Carly Clem, Administrative Specialist, for their outstanding support in providing the Commission with the resources needed to carry out our mission. This report is the result of our combined efforts.

It has been a pleasure to work with you and members of the Commission during our term of service. We are confident that you will continue to support the Commission's efforts to enhance the lives of our veterans. Our meetings are open to the public, and we invite you to join us for any meeting.

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SUMMARY OF 2014 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The accomplishments of the Commission on Veterans Affairs in 2014 were crucial in laying the foundation for 2015, which was designated by County Executive Isiah Leggett and County Council President Craig Rice on November 10, 2014 as “*2015: The Year of Montgomery County’s Veterans and Their Families.*”
- We worked with the Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs to secure land from the Maryland Department of Natural Resources in Seneca Creek State Park in Germantown for a new home for the headquarter of the Warrior Canine Connection (WCC). WCC continues to show great promise in providing an effective, non-pharmaceutical intervention model that helps treat symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder and traumatic brain injury.
- We supported the Veterans Collaborative as it held a Veteran Resource and Volunteer Fair in May at Glen Echo Park to educate members of the public about volunteer opportunities to help veterans and their families.
- We continue our efforts to combat veteran homelessness through our support of Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing (VASH) vouchers. The County has received 80 VASH vouchers over the last four years, each worth \$13,122 or \$1,049,760 per year in housing subsidies.
- We take seriously our duties to publically recognize our veterans. They should be thanked for service to their Nation in uniform and also for continued service as public servants, students, employees, and cherished neighbors. The Commission worked with both the Rockville Public Library and the Silver Spring Civic Building to install flat screen televisions that are dedicated to scrolling the names and pictures of County residents killed in action in combat dating back to World War II. In addition the Silver Spring Display includes information for Veterans and all active military.
- In November the Commission participated in the dedication of Memorial Plaza. The design includes an eternal flame dedicated to the memory of those who have sacrificed their lives in service to our country.
- These accomplishments establish the foundation for 2015, the Year of Montgomery County Veterans and their Families. We will not rest and will continue to find innovative and effective tools to help veterans and their families. We held the November public meeting at Flower Valley Elementary School near Olney for our first-ever satellite meeting. This will allow the Commission to talk to veterans in the neighborhoods in which they live, educating them on the Commission’s efforts while giving veterans and their families an opportunity to educate the Commission on their needs and concerns.
- The Commission has continued to press the Veterans Administration for a Community-Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) in Montgomery County. Representatives from the Commission, the County Executive, Congressman Van Hollen and Senator Cardin met regularly with staff from the VA Medical Center for several months on the progress of such a clinic. Led by Congressman Van Hollen, all three members of Congress whose districts include Montgomery County wrote a joint letter to then-Secretary Shinseki expressing their very strong support for the clinic. County Executive Leggett wrote a similar letter. A Montgomery County CBOC is now in the VA budget for VISN-5, our area VA health network, and is currently in review under the Strategic Capital Investment Planning (SCIP) process.
- Vice-Chair Dan Bullis and Commissioner Wayne Miller were featured on the County Cable Montgomery talk show *Seniors Today* with host Austin Heyman. You can view the video by visiting:

In observance of Veterans Day, the new Memorial Plaza located on the Government Complex Center Terrace between the new Courthouse annex and the Executive Office Building in Rockville along Route 28 was officially dedicated and the eternal flame unveiled on November 10.

The ceremony was an opportunity for the County to show its appreciation and support for those people who put their lives on the line, domestically and abroad, to ensure our continued safety.

Among those participating was retired Navy CDR Everett Alvarez Jr. of Rockville, who was the first U.S pilot to be downed and detained during the Vietnam War and spent over eight years in captivity, making him the second longest held American POW, after U.S. Army Colonel Floyd James Thompson.

The plaza is part of the Judicial Center Annex construction project that began in 2011 and involved an addition to, and renovation of, the existing Judicial Center, according to a county news release. The plaza and green spaces were redesigned to invite public use of the space. The area features a water fountain, new trees, benches and a Memorial Walkway to receive the plaques that were relocated from the original Memorial Garden to allow for the construction of the annex.





On behalf of the Commission on Veterans Affairs, we want to thank you for your efforts on behalf of the County's almost 50,000 veterans. Here are the Commission's top policy issues for FY15:

The Council work with us to increase access in the County to health care for veterans. The County needs to encourage veterans and their families to enroll them in the VA health care system and we ask that information be provided on County Ride On buses as to how to enroll. The County needs to continue to press to build more collaborative relationships with the VA Medical Center in D.C., with the ultimate goal of establishing a Community Based Outpatient Clinic in the county. This could include asking the DCVAMC to have a shuttle to Montgomery County.

The Council work with us to increase outreach to the general veteran population regarding programs, services and recognition events; and this includes supporting veterans at Montgomery College and the Universities at Shady Grove. We are working to increase VA presence in the county. The Commission achieved a major goal in having a full-time Veterans Service Officer funded by the Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs stationed at Montgomery College to help veterans with their benefits, but the county's relationship with the VA medical system is still very limited. Now the Veterans Service Officer has resigned and they are in the hiring process

We continue to encourage cooperation, coordination and collaboration among all agencies and non-profits that serve veterans so that everyone works together to provide the best services possible to veterans and their families.

We will be asking the County Executive to designate 2015 as "The Year of Montgomery County Veterans and their Families." If there is one thing that military service teaches you, it's the importance of teamwork – standing shoulder to shoulder with the Solider, Marine, Airman, Sailor or Coast Guardsman next to you. Our veterans and their families stood shoulder to shoulder for us; we must now stand shoulder to shoulder for them. They deserve no less.

EMPLOYMENT INITIATIVES TO INCREASE HIRING

The Commission on People with Disabilities began advocating for a non-competitive hiring process for people with disabilities, similar to the Federal Government, in the early 90's and in the past eight years formed a strong collaboration for this effort from the Office of Human Resources (OHR), Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Commission on Veterans Affairs, County Executive Ike Leggett and the entire County Council. OHR and HHS has worked with Montgomery Works, Department of Rehabilitation Services (DORS), SEEC (Seeking Equality, Empowerment and Community), Ivymount School and other agencies to implement programs and hiring initiatives that will increase the hiring of these under-employed populations. To promote a more inclusive workforce the County has also implemented Quest, Project Search, Customized Employment Program and legislation in 2009 for a competitive hiring preference for veterans and people with disabilities. The County Executive and County Council enacted Executive Regulation 1-13 which made effective a non-competitive hiring authority for people with severe disabilities in the County government in 2013. This is a non-competitive appointment of qualified persons with disabilities. As a result of these initiatives, since 2012, the County has hired the following into positions as of August 14, 2014:

- Total Hires: 119
- Non Competitive Hires of People with Severe Disabilities: 11
- People with Disabilities: 10
- Vet: 94
- Veterans with Disabilities: 4

MIKULSKI, CARDIN ANNOUNCE OVER \$1.3 MILLION IN FEDERAL FUNDING FOR JOB TRAINING VETERANS

Grants Will Fund Job Skills Training, Career Counseling for Veterans

U.S. Senators Ben Cardin and Barbara A. Mikulski (both D-Md.) today announced a grant in the amount of \$1,334,427 from the U.S Department of Labor (DOL) to provide job training to homeless veterans in Maryland. The grants are being awarded under the Department’s Homeless Veterans’ Reintegration Program, administered by the Veterans’ Employment and Training Service.

“Our veterans have sacrificed for this nation and we have a responsibility to provide them with the training and skills they need to transition from the military to civilian world. No veteran who has served this nation honorably should ever want for a roof over his or her head,” said **Senator Cardin**, a member of the Senate Finance Committee. “These federal funds will give veterans the tools they need to find a job and reclaim their lives in communities across Maryland.”

“I believe our support for our military in the field must be matched by support for our veterans at home,” **Senator Mikulski**, Chairwoman of the Senate Appropriation Committee which funds DOL, and a member of the Senate Veterans Jobs Caucus and Senate Military Families Caucus. “Our veterans who have fought on the front lines shouldn’t have to stand in line for a job when they get home. These funds in the federal checkbook are critical to providing on-the-job training, helping homeless veterans get off the street and back on the job.”

The funding was awarded on a competitive basis to state and local workforce investment boards, local public agencies and nonprofit organizations, including faith-based and community organizations. Grantees have proven that they can effectively provide homeless veterans with the requisite skills to find employment. Grantees will also assist veterans with career counseling, life skills, money management, and housing placement. The Maryland funding is part of a larger \$36,710,368 package that will aid 12,000 veterans nationwide. \$9,094,355 will go to new grantees.

COMMUNITY-BASED OUTPATIENT CLINIC (CBOC) UPDATE

Dear Secretary Shinseki:

I am writing to inform you of my strong support for the position taken by Congressmen Chris Van Hollen, John Delaney, and Jon Sarbanes regarding what appears to be another delay in the earlier decision to open a Community-Based Outpatient Clinic (CBOC) in Montgomery County, Maryland in 2015. Dr. Brian Hawkins (the VA's Director of the Washington, DC VA Medical Center) conveyed his intention to open the CBOC to my Commission on Veterans Affairs (CVA), including representatives of Congressman Chris Van Hollen and Senator Ben Cardin, almost a year ago. A CBOC for Montgomery County was initially authorized in 2008 and scheduled to begin serving Montgomery County's almost 44,600 veterans and others in the Washington, DC metropolitan area sometime in 2010. That did not happen.

Since June 2013, Senator Cardin and Congressman Van Hollen's representatives, the Chair of the CVA, the staff liaison to the CVA, and a member of my staff have been working with Dr. Hawkins' representatives to begin planning for the opening of the CBOC in FY15. However, those meetings were informational only with the staff informing the group where they were in the process. Meetings were held in June and October 2013, and February 2014 (rescheduled from January 2014 because of weather). At the June 2013 meeting, the group was informed that an RFP for space was to be issued within the next thirty days. In fact, the group was informed that the planning had gone as far as designating the general area for the CBOC to be located at south of Shady Grove Road in Gaithersburg, east of I-270, and north of I-495. Optimally, the space would be sized at an estimated 5,000 square feet. At the October 2013 meeting, VA representatives stated that while the RFP had not yet been issued, the plans remained unchanged.

To my dismay, we were advised that the CBOC planned for Montgomery County will be reviewed in light of all other needs and budget constraints, by the VISN's Strategic Capital Investment Plan (SCIP). That review is to apply to previously authorized and scheduled CBOCs. It is difficult for me to imagine how either needs or budget constraints had changed to the point of having to trigger the review. Few anticipated any relief from budget constraints in the near future. Those constraints, including sequestration, were known in June and October 2013; those budget issues must have been known in June 2013 when we were informed that the CBOC was imminent. The fact that the RFP had not yet been issued by October 2013 is evidence that further delays were under consideration. Your staff could have, and should have informed us at that time. While I certainly understand cost-effective strategic planning, I am frustrated by the continued lack of a CBOC here to serve those veterans in need of physical and mental health care, all services which a CBOC would provide.

Although not all veterans enrolled in VA health care actually use it, I believe that much of that lack of use is the result of limited access to care. When one looks at the poverty rates in certain parts of the County where veterans live, one can see that many would avail themselves of VA's health care if services were more readily accessible. I am disheartened by the fact that Montgomery County's veterans will not have that access as we expected. That said, please be assured that we are quite determined to work with your staff to realize a CBOC which will serve our cadre of 44,600 veterans.

I urge you to reconsider any further delay in the establishment of a CBOC in Montgomery County.

Readjustment Counseling Services

After war, some veterans experience psychological and social distress and difficulties in readjusting to civilian life. In 1979, the Department of Veterans Affairs established Vet Centers to assist Vietnam-era veterans with such problems. Congress later expanded Vet Center services to include combat veterans of other conflicts. These services are available at Vet Centers in all 50 states, Puerto Rico, the US Virgin Islands and Guam.

Services Available

- Individual counseling
- Marital and family counseling
- VA benefits assistance and referral
- Substance abuse counseling and referrals
- Primary health care for basic medical needs
- Pre-employment assistance and employment counseling
- Discharge upgrade information
- Community, social service and medical referrals
- Sexual trauma / harassment counseling (veterans of all eras)

The Vet Center also has a network of federal, state, city and community resources to help you. We will try to address any concerns or problems you bring to us.

At the Vet Center, you can expect help from professional counselors who will treat you with respect and understanding. Many of the counselors are also war veterans, so they understand your problems first hand, and have the training and skills to help solve them.

There is no charge for the assistance you receive at the Vet Center because of your sacrifices and efforts for this country. Veterans applying for assistance are asked to bring a copy of their Military Separation or Military Discharge (DD214) with them.

VETERAN DOG TRAINING THERAPY ORGANIZATION TO EXPAND INTO SENECA CREEK STATE PARK

Cpl. Justin Bunce doesn't like doing his physical therapy exercises for his arm. In fact, he sometimes refuses. But hand him a brush and tell him Breeze, a yellow lab, needs to be groomed, and he's happy to help out.

Brushing uses the same motion as the exercises that are supposed to help him regain mobility in his left side after being injured in service by an improvised explosive device while deployed as a Marine in Iraq.

Breeze spends most of her time at the NeuroRestorative house in Germantown where Bunce lives, spending time with him and the five other military service members living there on their way to recovery from brain injuries. She is being trained as a service dog and once she graduates from training, Warrior Canine Connection will pair her with a veteran.

Warrior Canine Connection uses dogs for therapy and teaches service members to train service dogs that will assist veterans. The organization recently came to an agreement with the state to use part of Seneca Creek State Park in Germantown to expand its program.

NeuroRestorative is a nationwide rehabilitation company for people recovering from brain injuries. The company's Germantown residence hosts military service members as a midway point between the hospital and moving home. Since the company began working with Warrior Canine Connection in the summer of 2012, "we noticed immediately" the changes in the veterans interacting with dogs, said lead Life Skills Trainer Katie Gorman.

"There's just a certain therapy that dogs can provide that people can't," Gorman said.

Founded three years ago by Rick Yount, Warrior Canine Connection works with veterans at facilities including Walter Reed in Bethesda, Fort Belvoir in Virginia, and several in California.

On Thursday visitors from NeuroRestorative spent time with the dogs at Warrior Canine Connection's Brookeville headquarters. While none are trainers yet, Army Sgt. Edward Wade, who returned from Iraq in 2004 after being injured by an IED, said he would like to become one.

One of the puppies, Lily, sat on Army 1st. Lt. Jonathon Kohl's lap. Lily takes the Metro every day so she can learn to assist a veteran with the commuting process, though the program hasn't paired her with anyone yet. Jonathon's wife, Aileen Kohl, sat next to him, reminding him of things when his memory failed him and translating his whispered mumbles when needed. Following a helicopter crash in Afghanistan in March 2013, Jonathon was in a coma for 140 days, she said. On Thursday he sat in a wheelchair petting Lily and talking to his wife and puppy program manager Cheryl Tipton. Aileen said Jonathon has relearned how to talk, eat and move in the last several months. He's working on being able to walk again and his memory is coming back slowly. But he has a good sense of humor about it, laughing when he confuses cats with dogs or asks the same questions repeatedly. With the new land at Seneca Creek Park, Warrior Canine Connection will be able to expand its programs and veterans will have a larger space where they can come for therapy, to train dogs, or just relax in a quiet place outdoors.

VETERAN DOG TRAINING THERAPY ORGANIZATION TO EXPAND INTO SENECA CREEK STATE PARK CONTINUED

The 25-year lease agreement allows the organization to use the Schaeffer Farm Area of the park, where it will build new facilities for apprentice service dog training, art and music therapy, acupuncture, equine therapy, and farming and gardening. According to Maryland Park Service Superintendent Nita Settina, in exchange for over \$700,000 in investments Warrior Canine Connection plans to put into the site, the first 10 years of rent will be forgiven. After 10 years, the organization will pay \$1,500 per month, with a rent increase of \$500 every five years.

Gorman said she has a hard time putting into words the impact Warrior Canine Connection has had on the veterans she works with. Having the dogs around the NeuroRestorative house, the patients start getting more sleep, have fewer outbursts and their outlooks become more positive. She remembers one veteran who no one could get through to until a dog did. He was “in a dark, dark place,” she said.

With one of the dogs, “you could see from afar him smiling, him laughing, and that’s all he wanted was someone to hang out with, someone to listen,” she said.

Training dogs is a healing process for many service members, and a way for them to help other veterans.

“They have to be coached to teach the dogs that the world is a safe place,” Yount explained. “They have to convince themselves the same.” It also allows the veterans to focus on the dogs instead of themselves in interactions.

One woman who lived at the NeuroRestorative house had such severe post-traumatic stress disorder that leaving the house was unthinkable. But when Gorman asked her to take a dog to the store as training, she didn’t think twice about it. With the focus on the dog, she hardly realized what she had accomplished until after she returned.

“Training them to be out in public is at the same time training for us,” Marine Sgt. Jon Gordon said. “Teaching the dog that a car backfire is OK, that people on the subway are OK.”

Gordon, 28, trained dogs through the program, including Birdie, the black lab that now lives with him. Before he connected with Birdie, Gordon got a few hours of sleep a night at best and didn’t want to interact with anyone.

“Being able to interact with people in general, I couldn’t do that before,” he said. “I pretty much isolated myself.”

Now Gordon lives in Michigan and hopes to extend canine therapy to other veterans through the Department of Veterans Affairs. He has taught several classes sharing his work and experience.

“It was a complete 180. I went from being just quiet, didn’t want to be with anybody, didn’t want to talk with anybody to, ‘I actually have purpose again,’” he said.

Good evening, my name is Jerry Godwin and I am speaking on behalf of the Montgomery County Commission on Veterans Affairs.

Since the Commission was established, we have been working to ensure that the Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs and the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs provides needed services and supports to our estimated 50,000 veterans living in our County. This past year, we are pleased to inform you that the Maryland Department of Veterans Affairs hired a full-time Veterans Benefits Officer (VBO) for the County. This person is now working at the Montgomery College Rockville Campus. We are also working to establish a VBO presence at the Universities of Shady Grove. He will also be spending two days a month at MontgomeryWorks in Wheaton and two days a month at the Silver Spring Vet Center.

We do ask that you support the County Executives recommended funding for the following community grants which will better support programs serving veterans:

1. Warrior Canine Connection - \$40,000
2. Mental Health Association of Montgomery County, MD, Inc. - \$75,000 – Community-based model to coordinate resources and increase awareness for military, veterans and their families.
3. Team River Runner, Inc. - \$33,500 – Van purchase to support therapeutic paddling for wounded veterans.

We will work with the County to increase its outreach to veterans regarding programs and services that they are eligible for. To achieve this we ask for your support in having the County identify the veterans that apply for services in the County. We are hopeful to educate the public on veteran resources such as a cable TV show, ride on bus posters and radio station spots. Our county's veterans are local citizens as well, and can/should be using the services afforded to *all* residents.

One of the Commission's duties is to assist in planning appropriate public acknowledgement of the contributions made by veterans and assist in planning commemoration activities recognizing the contributions of veterans. We are in the planning stages of having 2015 be designated the Year of the Veteran and Family in the County. This campaign will require much planning, community/business outreach in informing the community and identifying sponsors and partners as we honor our own.

Thank you for the opportunity to speak with you tonight. We are working to make our community an even better veteran friendly community.

PROJECTED NUMBER OF VETERANS IN MONTGOMERY COUNTY, MD

The U.S. Census Bureau, 2013, estimates that there are approximately **46,533 veterans living in Montgomery County, Maryland**. According to a 2013 American Community Survey conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau, 8.1% of Americans self-reported as being a veteran. The Census Bureau defines as veteran as men and women who have served (even for a short time), but are not currently serving, on active duty in the U.S. Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, or the Coast Guard, or who served in the U.S. Merchant Marine during World War II. People who served in the National Guard or Reserves are classified as veterans only if they were ever called or ordered to active duty, not counting the 4 to 6 months for initial training or yearly summer camps. All other civilians are classified as nonveterans.


