1. Welcome and introductions	 Monica Schaeffer introduced herself and co-chair, Nanine Meiklejohn and then asked those in attendance to introduce themselves (to include related work you are doing that impacts the AIC, e.g., updates on work doing for Age-Friendly, COA's Ageism study, etc.) 	N/A
 What we learned and follow-up actions to be taken by AIC regarding food insecurity Presentations: Nanine Meiklejohn and Mary Sweeney. 	 The committee heard presentations from representatives from the county government and several non-profit organizations, including the Montgomery County Food Council. The County Congregate Meal Program has expanded from 10 sites to 40 but still has just 3 full- time staff. They collect a lot of data, but they lack the staff capacity to evaluate the data; 	 Pazit will compose thank-you letters for all our December speakers to include requesting a "wish list" from each organization regarding what their needs are and how we can help them accomplish their goals.

	 According to the HHS Program Manager for Food Security, the most at-risk group includes seniors. HHS trains volunteers to help local income people prepare SNAP applications and coordinates with the Food Council. More outreach is needed to educate the community on services available. Non- profits participate by providing assistance with eligibility and application, assisting with gathering needed documentation and training volunteers. AIC needs to decide what level of involvement we want to have, i.e.: Higher level of access through education and outreach, improved transportation/ways to get people to the locations; additional 	
3. Finalizing the 2019 AIC topics and naming committee member leads from either the pre-discussed list or new suggestions:	 county staff capacity. Eight areas were previously identified in previous discussion regarding focus areas for the AIC committee. Discussions centered on what issues we would like to prioritize, eliminate or expand. Social Isolation/ Intergenerational Pathways/MCPS support for seniors in community schools Food Insecurity Affordable Housing including Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) for mid-income (increase awareness of the need),	 The Health & Wellness Committee recently did a presentation on social isolation. Will see if we can have them present their findings to us possibly at the February meeting. We need to pull together information and a letter must be written recommending that the AIC mission be updated to include Social Isolation. Final decision regarding actions on Food Insecurity will be discussed at the February meeting. Affordable Housing- Will be addressed at the April and May meetings. Is it a priority for the new County Executive? Need to explore alternatives such as home sharing

	 (LIHTC) HIF (Housing Initiative Fund) Enforcement of Rental Housing Codes Employment (no transition pathways for retirees and other older residents who want/need to work) Increase funding for Design for Life Pedestrian Safety (education campaign) Fire Safety- this is being covered by Health & Wellness Committee and will be eliminated. Villages (services, supports) 	 and ADUs. Review status of proposed new legislation regarding ADUs to be presented at the Community Forum on 1/19/19. Regarding the LIHTC, the Public Policy Committee is introducing a bill to study how it is being implemented on a state level. Most are currently going to Baltimore City. The county delegation can push for a study. Villages- need to increase the presence of villages in low-income areas (3 in particular). Need to move from small grants to county-supported initiatives. This will be the focus moving forward. Pedestrian Safety and Employment were also identified as issues we need to continue to address but will be saved for future meetings.
