Notably, the Access to Care work group focused on food access and security; the Environmental Health and Education work group focused on the environment as it pertains to public health; and the Public Health Administration work group suggested hiring a consultant and a staff member to consult on how to implement and conduct program evaluations and facilitate the use of data and resources to then inform Montgomery County decisionmakers on what programs and services are effective in serving residents' needs.

In addition, for FY25, COH members agreed to focus on priorities in three additional areas: maternal and child health, behavioral health, and providing a resource to oversee, manage, and efficiently operate health clinics across the county. We formed work groups to study the challenges or barriers that currently exist in those areas and will present our findings and suggestions to the County Executive and the County Council.

These past and current work groups are comprised of dedicated professionals who bring a wealth of expertise and passion to provide the County Executive and County Council with actionable suggestions and advice on how to improve the public health outcomes of Montgomery County citizens.

Of course, our advocacy would not have been possible without the support and collaboration of our partners, stakeholders, and community members. Your commitment to our shared mission has been instrumental in driving these successes, and I am deeply grateful for your continued dedication.

Mission and Purpose

The primary mission of the Montgomery County Commission on Health (COH) is to advise the County Executive and the County Council on public health issues, programs, services and the allocation of funds devoted to public health needs and to monitor and assess the priorities of the Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services (MCDHHS) in its efforts to address the health needs of residents in this County. The purpose of this report is to comply with the annual requirement that the COH provide the County Executive and the County Council with an update on the activities of the COH from July 2023 through June 2024.

County Code Enabling Legislation Sec. 24-24. Functions

To advise the County Executive and the County Council, the Commission must:

- 1. Periodically review available County public health programs, services, and facilities; and data on the health status of the County population and subgroups within it;
- 2. Comment on gaps, deficiencies, or duplication in County public health programs, services, and facilities; including health status disparities and inequities;
- 3. Report each year to the County Executive on the performance of DHHS public health programs, actions needed to improve the programs, and the priorities within which the improvements should be made;
- 4. Comment on the proposed allocation of funds to County public health programs in accordance with the Department's priorities, considering the available financial resources and the need for health cost containment;
- 5. Advise on local public health planning needs;
- Comment on the appropriateness of institutional health services proposed to be offered in the County and the metropolitan area by the private sector and nonprofit, state, or other public sector agencies;
- 7. Advise on the development of statewide criteria and standards for certificates of need and health planning, considering the regional impact when appropriate.
- 8. The Commission must report to and meet with the County Council, sitting as the County Board of Health, at least annually, on the programs and policies within its purview.

Structure

The Commission is comprised of 19 voting members with representation from consumers and providers of health services in the County. As dictated by County Code, the COH also has a representative from the Montgomery County Medical Society. In accordance with County Code the majority of the 19 commissioners were consumers with the balance being providers, including the Medical Society representative. The ex officio (non-voting) members of the COH include the County Health Officer and the County Council liaison. The COH continues to represent a diverse cross-section of Montgomery County residents.

Membership consisted of 18 members who were racially and ethnically diverse and vary in age, gender, geography and experience in health policy, public health, and the health care system.

The COH Chair and Vice Chair are elected by COH members and serve one-year terms. During FY24 Susan Emery was the Chair of the Commission and Gabriela Lemus was the Vice Chair.



Meetings

The COH meets at 6 p.m. on the third Thursday of the month (except in August). All meetings are open to the public. The COH met monthly via the virtual meeting platform Zoom during the 2024 fiscal year. The COH had one hybrid meeting, offering both in-person and virtual attendance, for the retreat March 22nd 2024.

At a minimum, every member of the Commission is expected to either serve on one workgroup and, when possible, as a liaison to other health-related County boards, commissions, committees or minority health initiatives and programs.

With its broad perspective of public health, the COH recognizes the value of collaboration and communication with other health-related boards, commissions and committees. Many commissioners have an area of specialization, interest or constituency of public health and are therefore encouraged to serve as liaisons with other relevant health-related boards, commissions and committees (BCCs). Integral to this area of special interest is the constraint that all actions are in voice of the entire COH and not self-serving in any manner. Finally, members of the COH also served on committees that allowed the COH to conduct its business such as the membership, nominating and retreat planning committees. These committees require significant time and are in addition to the monthly scheduled meetings.

Commission on Health Workgroups Summary Reports

Access to Care

The Access to Care Workgroup was formed at the September 2022 COH Annual retreat to support increasing access to care to meet the health needs of all residents more completely. The COH reaffirmed the mission of the workgroup at the 2023 Annual Retreat. Through consultation with County staff and community-based organizations, the workgroup decided to narrow its focus this year to food access and security, extending its previous year work on ensuring adequate access to produce "food is Medicine" by including weekday produce markets in areas designated as food deserts. This workgroup shared their advocacy letter with the County Executive in December 2023 and met with County Council members in March-April 2024 with the following recommendations:

- Conduct a formal evaluation of the Choice Pantry Model to assess its suitability for broader implementation.
- Enhance investment in cold storage infrastructure for food distribution programs.

Environmental Health and Education

For Fiscal Year 2024, the Environmental Health and Education Working Group within the Montgomery County Commission on Health continued with its focus on the intersection of environmental and public health, which started in 2022. In early FY24, the workgroup finalized the advocacy letter which identifies the need to better educate Montgomery County residents about the impact of environmental issues on their health. The environmental health and education advocacy letter was approved by the Commission on Health and subsequently sent to the County Executive in December 2023 and to County Council in March 2024.

Additionally, the working group met regularly to go over and analyze information and data from different resources related to the impact of the environment and public health. Working group representatives presented the Environmental Health & Education advocacy letter to the Climate, Energy and Air Quality Advisory Committee and Water Quality Advisory Group with the goal of informing on the WG efforts and to request support.

The WG identified the Environmental Health and Education priorities for FY25: Environmental Threats - Common environmental threats are not well known and yet are responsible for millions of deaths each year (WHO, 2022). The Commission on Health will advocate for engaging in an environmental justice screening process. This process will combine environmental and demographic indicators in maps and reports and inform County residents and policymakers.

Environmental Education - Public health education related to the environment is critical for all Montgomery County residents but is particularly important within communities that have been historically disadvantaged by environmental burdens, including communities of color and low-wealth communities. The importance of fusing environmental health and timely communications to increase community resilience is essential. The Commission on Health encourages planning across departments and the development of health-related education to raise awareness about environmental hazards in general and in Montgomery County.

In late 2023, a new advocacy letter was drafted by the workgroup which advocates for a comprehensive strategy that integrates climate mitigation and adaptation measures with targeted public health interventions. Furthermore, the advocacy letter strongly recommends for the FY25 budgeting to include funding for public education campaigns on heat and air quality since they are crucial to ensuring that the public is well-informed about the interplay between heat, air quality, and chronic conditions. In addition, we strongly urged the Office of the County Executive to actively engage with the Maryland State Department of Labor's OSHA office to champion the establishment of a comprehensive standard aimed at safeguarding workers, including outdoor workers, from heat stress in the workplace. On April 5, 2024, members of the working group met with Councilmember Gabe Albornoz to present and discuss the recommendations detailed in the environmental health and education advocacy letter with the intent to inform, receive feedback and obtain support from Councilmember Albornoz.

Public Health Administration

The COH's Public Health Administration (PHA) Workgroup identified program evaluation as a key priority for 2023. Its members heeded calls from the County Executive, PHA staff, as well as County Council members and set a budget for a consultant to develop this program and make recommendations on what resources will be needed to implement it. Specifically, its purpose was to both quantitatively and qualitatively evaluate if the dozens of programs and services, external contractor performance, and technical assistance are effective in serving residents' needs. In addition, the consultant was to provide a set of evaluation criteria for programs and facilities to use when gauging what resources and services they may require in the future.

The PHA Workgroup also recommended hiring a Senior Planning Specialist to analyze data gathered on and from the five Health Care for the Uninsured programs to make recommendations for improvement. In addition, this specialist would investigate how to measure customer satisfaction and employee retention to gauge each program's effectiveness, and then share this knowledge with parties focused on uninsured, underinsured, and underrepresented populations. Last, it was expected that this individual would also serve as a resource for the evaluation program described above.
