Housing and Community Development

- Complete installation of Sprinkler Systems for HOC Elderly Properties in FY14.

Housing and Community Development

In addition to \$7.3 million in taxable bonds, \$9.1 million in loan repayments and \$8.0 million in general obligation bonds will be used to continue the County's commitment to the creation and preservation of affordable housing units for low-income residents, including the senior population.
- Continue funding to support Public Housing Improvements through the Supplemental funds for Deeply Subsidized HOC Owned Units Improvements project.
- Complete installation of Sprinkler Systems for HOC Elderly Properties in FY14.
- Complete streetscaping, façade easements, and pedestrian linkages in the Fenton Street Village area in FY14.
- Continue funding for façade easements in the Burtonsville area.

An Effective and Efficient Transportation Network...

Mass Transit

- Construct south entrance for the Bethesda Metrorail Station in coordination with the Purple Line project.
- Begin facility planning for the MD 355 and US 29 corridors as part of a rapid transit system.
- Replace 33 Ride On buses in Fiscal Year 2015.
- Fund a new Transit Center at Montgomery Mall with developer and County funding.
- Continue efforts to improve the condition of Ride On bus stops and transit park and ride lots.

Roads, Highway Maintenance, and Traffic Improvements

- Include non-vehicular transportation elements whenever feasible in road improvements and new roads including sidewalks, shared-use paths, and bike lanes.
- Add funding for the design and land acquisition of a new project: Observation Drive Extended, which will support economic development and provide north-south access and needed congestion relief between Germantown and Clarksburg.
- Support the White Flint Sector Plan through continued funding for planning and design, land acquisition, and construction of roadway improvements in the White Flint District. Over \$170 million in funding is programmed in the FY15-20 CIP for White Flint redevelopment; another \$169 million is programmed in supporting projects, such as Montrose Parkway East, Chapman Avenue Extended, and the new White Flint Fire Station #23.
- Continue to provide funding for Montrose Parkway East, Goshen Road South, Snouffer School Road, and Burtonsville Access Road to alleviate congestion and improve safety. The County will continue to coordinate with the State Highway Administration to complete the construction of Montrose Parkway East, which will provide improved access to the White Flint area and to Interstate 270.
- Complete the construction of Chapman Avenue Extended, Wapakoneta Road Improvements, Century Boulevard, Platt Ridge Drive Extended, Ripley Street, and East Gude Drive Roadway Improvements.

- Continue funding for intersection and roadway improvements to enhance traffic flow and improve vehicular and pedestrian safety on Seminary Road, Snouffer School Road North (Webb Tract), East Gude Drive, and Redland Road.
- Maintain a public-private partnership to support the Clarksburg Transportation Connections project to fund roadway and intersection improvements at several Clarksburg area roads to increase capacity and reduce traffic congestion in this growing area of the County.
- Add \$20 million for residential and rural road resurfacing to address resident concerns and avoid more costly future repairs.
- Complete construction of a new, underground parking garage in Bethesda's Central Business District.
- Continue the modernization of the central traffic signal control system to provide additional capabilities and tools to optimize traffic flow.
- Continue efforts to provide additional guardrails and streetlights.

Bikeway, Sidewalk, and Pedestrian Facilities

- Continue funding of two Purple-Line related projects: Capital Crescent Trail and the Silver Spring Green Trail.
- Continue funding of the Metropolitan Branch Trail, including a grade-separated bridge over Georgia Avenue.
- Continue funding of bike paths and bike lanes for Falls Road East Side Hiker/Biker Path, Seven Locks Bikeway and Safety Improvements, and Frederick Road Bike Path.
- Complete the construction of MacArthur Boulevard Bikeway Improvements, Bethesda Bikeway and Pedestrian Facilities, and the MD355 Sidewalk in Hyattstown.
- Leverage a state grant to complete the construction of the Needwood Road Bike Path and fund minor pedestrian and bikeway improvements through the Bikeway Program.
- Maintain funding levels for Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)
 Compliance: Transportation, Bikeway Program, Sidewalk Program, and Transportation Improvements for Schools.

Bridges and Storm Drains

- Replace the existing Park Valley Road Bridge over Sligo Creek.
- Replace the existing Piney Meetinghouse Road Bridge over Watts Branch.

- Provide superstructure replacement of the existing Valley Road Bridge over Booze Creek.
- Maintain funding for previously approved Whites Ferry Road, Gold Mine Road, and Elmhirst Parkway Bridges.
- As part of the County's leading efforts to improve water quality, continue to repair or replace failed storm drain outfalls, pipes, and culverts.

Children Prepared to Live and Learn...

Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS)

- Allocate over \$1.7 billion for school construction and technology enhancements. Local funding for school construction and technology is \$1.247 billion – a record high and \$128.5 million more than the previously approved budget.
- Assume success in leveraging an initial \$230.7 million in new state supported school financing to address overcrowding. At full implementation, the initiative will leverage \$600-700 million in new funding.
- Address capacity needs from higher enrollment by funding four new elementary schools and two new middle schools, and constructing additions in 18 elementary schools, two middle schools, and two high schools. Together, these projects will add 455 classrooms.
- Maintain the Board of Education (BOE) requested revitalizations/ expansions schedule for 21 elementary schools, four middle schools, and five high schools.
- Address Countywide special education needs by adding new funding for one alternative center, Blair Ewing Center Improvements.
- Increase funding for the Heating, Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) project by \$37 million.
- Maintain requested funding for MCPS Countywide infrastructure projects including roof replacements, school security systems, indoor air quality, and life-cycle asset replacement.
- Fund \$5.0 million for relocatables to address overutilization of the schools.
- As part of the Smart Growth Initiative (transit-oriented economic development), MCPS will benefit from the \$35.3 million MCPS Food Distribution Facility Relocation project.
- MCPS will benefit from the \$69.0 million MCPS & M-NCPPC Maintenance Facility Relocation project funded as part of the Smart Growth Initiative.

- Fund County projects which support MCPS initiatives to bolster at risk children and their families, including Linkages to Learning, School Based Health Centers, High School Wellness Centers, and Child Care in Schools.
- Other CIP projects benefiting MCPS' programs include: Pedestrian Safety Program, Transportation Improvements for Schools, FiberNet, Ballfields Initiatives (M-NCPPC), and Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center Building Envelope Improvement.
- Fund a feasibility study for adding a High School Wellness Center at Kennedy High School, which will support the broader Kennedy Initiative Project.
- All MCPS elementary schools will be on FiberNet by the end of the 2014 calendar year at speeds capable of supporting instructional video, telephony, high-speed Internet, and back office applications (12 sites remain to be completed).

Montgomery College (College)

- Continue to address space deficits on the College's Rockville campus by maintaining construction funding for the Science West Building Renovation and the Rockville Student Services projects both of which will provide up-to-date centralized facilities and leverage significant State funding.
- Complete the Science East Building Renovation (Spring 2014) and the Rockville Parking Garage (Summer 2015).
- In the Fall of 2014 complete the Germantown Bioscience Education Center; fund design and construction of the Germantown Science & Applied Studies Phase 1 Renovation project (completion in 2017); and continue to fund design of the Germantown Student Services Center.
- Provide funding for planning, design and the start of construction for the Takoma Park/Silver Spring Math & Science Center.
- Sustain College infrastructure projects such as Elevator Modernization, Planned Lifecycle Asset Replacement, Roof Replacement, and Site Improvements at the requested levels, to improve facilities and safety on all three campuses.
- Assume \$89.6 million in State aid, with \$11.2 million in FY15 for Montgomery College.

Universities at Shady Grove/University of Maryland System

Build a parking garage at the Universities at Shady Grove (USG) Campus to support expansion of academic programs, improve the campus, and leverage a new state-funded academic building for Biomedical Sciences/Engineering Education (BMSE).



Environmental Protection

- Maintain the County's leadership role in the state and nation by continuing the planning and implementation of stormwater controls, public outreach, stream monitoring, and other actions needed to comply with the County's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS-4) permit. This will significantly enhance the County's efforts to improve water quality in local streams and, ultimately, the Chesapeake Bay.
- Expand the design and construction of environmentally friendly stormwater management techniques known as environmental site design (ESD) or low impact development (LID) throughout the County, including County facilities.
- Construct new stormwater management facilities and retrofit old stormwater controls to prevent property damage, improve water quality, and protect habitat.
- Expand the County's efforts to prevent trash from polluting our streams and rivers.
- As part of the County's leading efforts to improve water quality, continue to repair or replace failed storm drain outfalls, pipes, and culverts.

Health and Human Services

- Complete site improvements and construction of a new Dennis Avenue Health Center in Silver Spring by Summer 2016 to improve clinical services to County residents.
- Construct a new Children's Resource Center at Rockville's Broome School site by Summer 2016 to provide services for child care providers, opportunities for parents and children to participate in preschool learning activities on a drop-in basis, and early intervention services for children with developmental delays.
- Construct a new Progress Place Services Center in conjunction with a public-private partnership by Summer 2016. Provide funds to create personal living quarters co-located with the Progress Place Services Center to provide affordable housing for low-income and homeless individuals.
- Pursue a public-private partnership with assistance from the State to replace the existing Avery Road Treatment Center and improve treatment services to residents.

- Provide funds to plan and design Linkages to Learning Centers at Wheaton Woods and Maryvale Elementary Schools beginning in Summer 2016 to provide social and health services for students and families in need.
- Provide funds to construct Child Care Centers at Wheaton Woods and Brown Station Elementary Schools beginning in Summer 2016 to offer quality child care programs.
- Complete construction of a High School Wellness Center (HSWC) in Summer 2015 to provide health services, counselling, and positive youth development at Wheaton High School and assess the feasibility of a HSWC at Kennedy High School.

Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC)

- Add two new projects:
 - Josiah Henson Historic Park project will rehabilitate the historic Riley/Bolton House, build a new visitor center, and fund site improvements to provide experiential learning regarding slavery and Josiah Henson, a former slave who served as the inspiration for the world famous novel, *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. This project will leverage \$2.0 million in private funding through the Montgomery Park Foundation Capital Campaign.
 - Western Grove Urban Park project will provide green open space near the densely populated Friendship Heights Metro Station area. The park was acquired through a partnership with the Chevy Chase Village.
- Add funding for Phase V of Brookside Gardens Master Plan Implementation to include construction of a new greenhouse and plant propagation facility. County funds will leverage state Program Open Space funding and a \$1.0 million private donation.
- Add funding for Woodside Urban Park in downtown Silver Spring.
- Increase funding for hard surface trail renovations.
- Increase funding for the on-going comprehensive effort to retrofit local parks and park facilities to comply with Title II of the American with Disabilities Act.
- Increase funding for environmental stewardship projects in order to meet today's standards and enhance environmental conditions across the park system.
- Continue to fund Planned Lifecycle Asset Replacement projects to upgrade park infrastructure.

Support M-NCPPC by funding a new M-NCPCC Headquarters building in the \$73.7 million Wheaton Redevelopment project and by funding the \$69.0 million MCPS & M-NCPPC Maintenance Facilities Relocation project.

Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC)

- Recommend \$1,070.0 million for WSSC, a decrease of \$540.1 million or 33.5 percent from the FY14-19 Approved CIP. The recommended budget does not include funding for a proposed WSSC anaerobic digester to dispose of biosolids due to the uncertainty of Federal Aid assumed in the funding schedule and since a less costly option may soon exist at DC Water's Blue Plains facility.
- Continue construction of improvements to wastewater treatment and solids handling facilities at the regional Blue Plains Advanced Wastewater Treatment Plant in order to achieve environmental goals and improve efficiency.
- Continue construction on the Bi-County Water Tunnel, which is scheduled for completion in July 2015.
- Inspect, evaluate, and repair sewer mains in environmentally sensitive areas within the Trunk Sewer Reconstruction Program.
- Upgrade the Blue Plains, Seneca, and Damascus wastewater treatment plants for enhanced nutrient removal to meet the environmental goals in the Chesapeake 2000 plan.
- Continue the Large Diameter Water Pipe Rehabilitation Program to repair, replace, monitor, and protect large cast iron and prestressed concrete cylinder pipe (PCCP) water mains, and extend these efforts to 36-inch diameter PCCP mains.
- Increase replacement of small diameter water mains from 51 miles in FY14 to 60 miles in FY15.
- Continue the system-wide implementation of automated meter reading technology.



Fire and Rescue Services

- Add \$51.9 million for a new apparatus replacement program to replace 9 aerials, 64 EMS units, 21 engines, 4 all-wheel drive brush/ wildland pumpers, 4 rescue squads, and 2 tankers.
- Add \$27.8 million for planning and construction of a new White Flint Fire Station to replace Rockville Station #23 and support the increased White Flint development.
- Add \$26.0 million for final design and construction of a permanent Clarksburg Fire Station.
- Continue to fund the relocation of Glenmont Fire Station #18 and the addition and renovation of Kensington (Aspen Hill) Fire Station #25.
- Continue to fund level-of-effort/ongoing projects including Life Safety Systems; Emergency Power System Upgrades; Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning/Electrical Replacement; Resurfacing paved areas; and Roof Replacement.
- Design and construct a female facility for the Cabin John Station #30 and Gaithersburg Station #8.
- Support planning funding for the Glen Echo Fire Station and Rockville Fire Station #3 renovation projects.

Police

- Replace the existing 2D District Station in Bethesda with a new station under a public-private partnership between the County and a private developer.
- Establish new public safety computer aided dispatch and records management systems.

Correction and Rehabilitation

- Build a Center at the Montgomery County Correctional Facility to provide practical training for correctional officers.
- Renovate and expand the 35 year-old kitchen and dining area at the County's Pre-Release Center to improve energy efficiency and provide adequate capacity.

Other Public Safety Initiatives

- Replace the public safety training academy for police and fire and rescue first responders.
- Complete construction of the Judicial Center Annex with 10 new courtrooms.

- Replace the public safety radio infrastructure to comply with the new federal requirements.
- Replace the Fire Station Alerting System in 43 fire stations.
- Purchase the GE Building/GE Technology Park which houses the new Public Safety Headquarters.



A Strong and Vibrant Economy...

Economic Development and Redevelopment

- Support the White Flint Sector Plan through continued funding for planning and design, land acquisition, and construction of roadway improvements in the White Flint District. Over \$170 million in funding is programmed in the FY15-20 CIP for White Flint redevelopment; another \$169 million is programmed in supporting projects, such as Montrose Parkway East, Chapman Avenue Extended, and the new White Flint Fire Station #23.
- Based on site plan approvals for the North Bethesda Market II and Pike & Rose developments in White Flint, up to 646,000 square feet of residential development and 907 residential units, as well as up to 1.8 million square feet of commercial space, has finished construction or is currently under construction. The first phase of the Pike & Rose development is expected to be delivered in Fall 2014.
- Complete a feasibility study for a structured parking garage at the Montgomery County Conference Center in White Flint to replace existing parking spaces at the Conference Center. The goal is to coordinate the parking garage construction with road development to avoid negative business impacts to the Conference Center and to consider mixed-use (retail and affordable housing) components to enhance private development in the White Flint area.
- Enter into negotiations with a developer to implement the public/private partnership redevelopment project in Wheaton. The project provides private residential and/or commercial development, a new headquarters for the M NCPPC, offices for the Mid-County Regional Services Center and other County Government agencies, a town square, and public parking. This project is critical to the County's economic development goals and the long-term economic vitality of Wheaton.

- Continue funding for the Smart Growth Initiative to move County facilities so that private, transit-oriented mixed use can occur near the Shady Grove Metro Station and the old Public Safety Training Academy (PSTA) site. These efforts will facilitate development of mixed use urban villages, including affordable housing, in a Life Sciences Development area.
- Conduct studies to identify potential redevelopment impacts on local communities and businesses in Wheaton.
- Complete a pilot, which includes solar-powered trash compactor program and facade improvements with State aid in Wheaton.
- Provide funds to support planning efforts for the redevelopment of the super block bounded by Arliss Street, Flower Avenue, and Piney Branch Road in the Long Branch Town Center area.
- Provide funds for various Mass Transit projects that will allow for continued high quality job creation in our major economic hubs.

Vital Living for All of Our Residents...

Libraries

- Construct a new library in downtown Silver Spring with an expected opening in FY15.
- Implement a new Library Refresh project with a goal of updating library branches on a seven-year cycle to respond to changing customer needs and to dramatically reduce renovation costs and service disruptions.
- Implement a new 21st Century Library Enhancements project that will allow public libraries to respond to customer demands and library trends that require changes in library equipment and related furnishings.
- Design and construct a combined Library and Community Recreation Center in Wheaton with an increased scope that includes the addition of the Gilchrist Center and structured parking.
- Add planning funds for the Clarksburg Library. The Executive is exploring all options for providing a library facility to the Clarksburg community.

Recreation

- Complete the Scotland Neighborhood Recreation Center with an expected opening in Summer 2014.
- Construct the Ross Boddy Neighborhood Recreation Center beginning in Spring 2014 with an expected opening in Summer 2015.
- Begin construction of the North Potomac Community Recreation Center project with planned completion in FY16.
- Implement a new project that renovates and modernizes the Western Outdoor Pool with an expected completion in Spring 2016.
- Design and construct a new Good Hope Neighborhood Recreation Center, resulting in the expansion/upgrade of the facility in compliance with the Special Protection Area (SPA), Storm Water Management (SWM), and Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requirements.
- Repair the exterior walls and other core systems of the Kennedy Shriver Aquatic Center to address problems related to the movement and condensation of moist indoor air through the building's exterior masonry walls and roof leaks.
- Conduct preliminary planning and site evaluation for the Clarksburg Community Recreation and Aquatic Center.
- Convert an unused outdoor roller hockey rink at the Potomac Community Recreation Center into an Adaptive Sports Court in order to provide a range of therapeutic recreation activities for individuals with disabilities by Summer 2014.
- Continue Capital Improvement Grants for the Arts and Humanities Organizations with \$6.1 million available for Arts and Humanities Organizations.

Revenue Authority

- Add a new project, HG Restroom Amenities and Grille at the Hampshire Greens Golf Course, to construct a facility with restrooms and a grille/snack bar area near the ninth tee.
- Focus on long-term sustainability of fixed assets including modifications to the clubhouse food service areas, irrigation, and clubhouse seating improvements to the Falls Road, Little Bennett, Needwood, Northwest, and Poolesville golf courses.
- Continue to implement the next phase of the Airport Layout Plan and the Airport Capital Improvement Plan accepted by the Federal Aviation Administration.



- Recommend a total of \$4.49 billion for the FY15-20 CIP for all agencies excluding WSSC, an increase of \$103.0 million or 2.3 percent from the previous CIP.
- Recommend \$4.10 billion for the tax-supported portion of the CIP which excludes stormwater management, HOC, and the Revenue Authority. This represents a \$51.7 million or 1.3 percent increase from the previous CIP.
- Recommend \$1,070.0 million for WSSC, a decrease of \$540.1 million or 33.5 percent from the FY14-19 Approved CIP. The recommended budget does not include funding for a proposed WSSC anaerobic digester to dispose of biosolids due to the uncertainty of Federal Aid assumed in the funding schedule and since a less costly option may soon exist at DC Water's Blue Plains facility.
- Increase general obligation borrowing by \$177.0 million over the six-year CIP.
- Assume an additional \$230.7 million in School Financing Bonds as a first step towards a \$600-700 million initiative to address school overcrowding. A collaborative effort with our State delegation, the County Council, the Board of Education, and Parent Teacher Associations has been initiated to secure the necessary State legislative support for this effort.
- Use all taxes levied on developers for projects that address needs generated by development.
- Keep tax-supported borrowing within prudent limits.
- Issue debt at levels necessary to ensure continuation of Montgomery County's AAA credit rating.
- Program Park and Planning bonds within the Spending Affordability Guidelines.

- Assume State and Federal aid as follows:
 - \$240 million in traditional state aid for school construction;
 - \$89.6 million for Montgomery College;
 - \$60 million for stormwater management projects that improve water quality in local streams and the Chesapeake Bay;
 - \$10 million for rapid transit system planning for the US29 and MD355 corridors. An additional \$15.6 million is also assumed for other transportation projects; and
 - \$5.3 million for the Department of Corrections' Pre-Release Center Dietary Facilities Improvements and Staff Training Center projects.
- State aid has also been requested for the Dennis Avenue Health Clinic, the Children's Resource Center, and the Avery Road Treatment Center.




