




Capital Improvements Program (CIP)




Capital Budget: Facilities

- Capital Improvements have long-term useful life
- Six-year capital budget plan
- Biennial capital budget
- Full CIP considers changes to all projects
- Biennial CIP changes must adhere to amendment criteria
- New projects often added in the last two years
- Your feedback informs the next full CIP (FY27-32)


County Executive Recommended FY26 Capital Budget and Amendments to the FY25-30 CIP

- Citizen Advisory Board Capital Budget Forums
- Council public hearings on the Capital Budget
- Boards, Committees and Commissions
- Emails/letters to the County Executive, County
 Council and School Board members
- Public meetings and charettes on community projects
- MC311 to report needed infrastructure repairs

County and MCPS' CIPs:



Separate but Connected

- Board of Education adopts and transmits a recommended capital budget
- County Executive recommends a funding allocation rather than specific MCPS projects
- Executive Branch partners with MCPS & Council to advocate for additional State Aid
- Similar process with Montgomery College,
 M-NCPPC and WSSC Water
- Residents should contact these agencies directly with requests




How the Capital and Operating Budgets are Related

FY26 Fixed & Other Commitments as a % of General Fund Revenue (\$millions)




Capital Budget Challenges

- Great need
 - Aging infrastructure
 - New and expanded facilities due to population changes
 - Community expectation for new and improved infrastructure
- Inflation
- Federal funding uncertainty
- Volatile revenues such as Impact and Recordation Taxes
- General Obligation debt limitations



Infrastructure Demands vs Ability to Borrow and Invest in Infrastructure


Investment needed to maintain buying power: The chart below illustrates the General Obligation (GO) Bonds borrowed to fund the Montgomery County Capital Improvements Program (depicted in grey). This program is essential for building and maintaining critical community infrastructure. Additionally, the chart shows the amount needed (represented in blue) to sustain the same purchasing power as in FY2009, adjusted for inflation and construction costs.


Need for Tax Restructuring

- Current property and real estate transaction tax structure is centered on the taxation of residential development
- It is reflective of the economy of the 1950s and 1960s fueled by post WWII rapid growth of residential development
 - During this time, we were able to build the best schools and modern infrastructure
- Montgomery County is now a mature and developed community
- To maintain our competitive edge and continue to have a vital community we must continue to invest in our schools and modernize our transportation infrastructure to reflect a 21st century community
- The communities in Northern Virginia have figured out a way to do this and we must follow suit
- These are not new taxes this is restructuring how we tax in order to maintain critical investments
