MS. ROBESON: This is a public hearing in the matter of an accessory apartment objection filed by Anne M. Scott and Benjamin and Susan Overbey, separate objections, Case No. AAO-14-02 to a conditional finding made by DHCA, the Department of Housing and Community Affairs, to approve an accessory apartment license, License No. 83032 for property at 16820 Westbourne Terrace, Gaithersburg, Maryland 20878.
