Special Appropriation to the FY20 Capital Budget and Amendment to the FY19-24 Capital Improvements Program, Montgomery County Public Schools, \$446,075 for the Technology Modernization Project (Source of Funds: Current Revenue-General Fund Reserves)

DESCRIPTION/ISSUE

The County Council will hold a public hearing and consider action on a special appropriation to MCPS' FY20 Capital Budget for the Technology Modernization project. This will be used to provide equipment, software, and support to implement the Montgomery Can Code initiative during the summer of 2020.

SUMMARY OF KEY DISCUSSION POINTS

- On May 21, the Council introduced this special appropriation based on a funding need for the Montgomery Can Code Initiative identified in a May 19 letter from the Superintendent of Schools.
 On May 28, the Board of Education formally approved a request for this funding. This initiative is being implemented in partnership with Montgomery College and the Montgomery County Economic Development Corporation.
- The Board's request notes that, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Montgomery Can Code summer camp has shifted from a face-to-face platform on the Montgomery College campus to an all-virtual model. Instructors, both college faculty and MCPS teachers, have been hired by Montgomery College and will engage in extensive professional development to deliver the program in an online model. The camp is planned as a week-long experience for students, rotating in groups for five consecutive weeks, beginning July 13. Approximately 1,200 rising Grades 6–8 students at all 40 MCPS middle schools have registered for the camp. Based on a prioritized registration process, approximately two-thirds of the registrants are from 14 middle schools with the greatest Free and Reduced-price Meals System (FARMS) service rates.

Background

- 1. Section 308 of the County Charter provides that a special appropriation is an appropriation which states that it is necessary to meet an unforeseen disaster or other emergency, or to act without delay in the public interest. Each special appropriation shall be approved by not less than six Councilmembers. The Council may approve a special appropriation at any time after public notice by news release. Each special appropriation shall specify the source of funds to finance it.
- 2. Section 302 of the County Charter provides that the Council may amend an approved capital improvements program at any time by an affirmative vote of no fewer than six members of the Council.
- 3. On March 11, 2020 the World Health Organization declared coronavirus COVID-19 a pandemic, and it has spread rapidly throughout the world. As of April 26, 2020, there were 3,645 confirmed cases in Montgomery County. There were 160 confirmed deaths and 20 probable deaths in Montgomery County. To slow the spread of the disease, Maryland Governor Hogan declared a State of Emergency. Executive Orders have closed schools, closed non-essential business, and issued a stay-at-home order for Maryland residents. Though the state stay-at-home order is now a safer-at-home order, Montgomery County is still a stay-at-home jurisdiction.
- 4. On March 16, 2020 Montgomery County Public Schools were ordered to be closed by the Maryland State Department of Education. The school system initiated a phased in continuity of learning model focusing on independent and self-paced student interaction with teachers. This model also incorporated content and new assignment availability at all levels. In order to ensure equity and access to this continuum of learning for all students, Montgomery County Public Schools loaned out school devices to students in need.

- 5. Montgomery County Public Schools is currently in Phase III of its Continuity of Learning online plan which runs until June 15th. The school system is still assessing and planning for summer programming (including Montgomery Can Code) and continued learning opportunities as well as preparing for how learning will continue, and in what capacity come this Fall.
- 6. In these COVID-19 times, and moving forward, it is a priority of Montgomery County Public Schools to have adequate supply and distribution of technology devices for all students. Turnover of devices is a reality as they reach the end of their useful lifespan. This appropriation will help ensure Montgomery County Public Schools has the technology devices needed as it moves beyond Phase III learning into the summer and our next school year. Devices are no longer options, but necessary tools needed by all our students in order to continue their education.
- 7. Notice of public hearing was given and a public hearing was held.

Action

The County Council for Montgomery County, Maryland approves the following resolution:

Fiscal Year 2020 Supplemental Appropriation Request for Montgomery Can Code

Initiative

Montgomery County Public Schools (MCPS) has been engaged with Councilmember Craig Rice, Chair, Montgomery County Council Education and Culture Committee; Montgomery College; the Montgomery County Economic Development Corporation (MCEDC); additional Montgomery County leaders; and business and community partners to develop an innovative approach to teach coding and computer science to middle school students. This initiative has come together as the Montgomery Can Code Initiative, which aims to serve approximately 1,200 MCPS students at all 40 middle schools this summer by teaching them how to code. The goal of this program is to expand access to middle schools students to teach them valuable skills that they can use in future learning and in the future workforce.

With student interest remaining strong and determined support among our partners during the COVID-19 pandemic, summer camp has shifted from a face-to-face platform on the Montgomery College campus to an all-virtual model. Montgomery College, MCEDC, and MCPS extensively have planned during the last several weeks to be in a position to move forward with the virtual camp experience. Instructors, both college faculty and MCPS teachers, have been hired by Montgomery College and will engage in extensive professional development to deliver the program in an online model. As part of this partnership, funding for instructors and professional development is being provided by Montgomery College. The program will be provided at no cost for students. The camp is planned as a week-long experience for students, rotating in groups for five consecutive weeks, beginning Monday, July 13, 2020. Approximately 1,200 rising Grades 6–8 students at all 40 MCPS middle schools have registered for the camp. Based on a prioritized registration process, approximately two-thirds of the registrants are from 14 middle schools with the greatest Free and Reduced-price Meals System (FARMS) service rates.

The MCPS funds needed for this initiative total \$446,075 and include the equipment, software, and set-up requirements. The Montgomery County Council has expressed its intent to consider a supplemental appropriation to provide funding to support this initiative. This amount is inclusive of all cost expectations for this program. The following table provides detailed itemization for the budgetary requirements necessary for the Montgomery Can Code initiative.

Resolved, That the county executive be requested to recommend approval of this resolution to the County Council.
