## **DESCRIPTION/ISSUE**

This CIP amendment and supplemental appropriation will fund the replacement of 81 aging heart monitors/defibrillators that are approaching the end of their useful life assigned to Montgomery County Fire and Rescue units and training facilities. This increase is needed to accelerate the replacement of aging heart monitors/defibrillators with an inflationary adjustment. The recommended amendment is consistent with the criteria for amending the CIP because it leverages significant non-County sources of funds provided through the Emergency Service Transporter Supplemental Payment Program.

Appropriation for this Project will fund the replacement of 81 aging heart monitors/defibrillators that are approaching the end of their useful life assigned to Montgomery County Fire and Rescue units and training facilities.

This increase is needed to accelerate the replacement of aging heart monitors/defibrillators with an inflationary adjustment. The Recommended amendment is consistent with the criteria for amending the CIP because it leverages significant non-County sources of funds provided through the Emergency Service Transporter Supplemental Payment Program.

## **Background**

- 1. Section 307 of the Montgomery County Charter provides that any supplemental appropriation shall be recommended by the County Executive who shall specify the source of funds to finance it. The Council shall hold a public hearing on each proposed supplemental appropriation after at least one week's notice. A supplemental appropriation that would comply with, avail the County of, or put into effect a grant or a Federal, State or County law or regulation, or one that is approved after January 1 of any fiscal year, requires an affirmative vote of five Councilmembers. A supplemental appropriation for any other purpose that is approved before January 1 of any fiscal year requires an affirmative vote of six Councilmembers. The Council may, in a single action, approve more than one supplemental appropriation. The Executive may disapprove or reduce a supplemental appropriation, and the Council may reapprove the appropriation, as if it were an item in the annual budget.
- 2. Section 302 of the Montgomery County Charter provides that the Council may amend an approved capital improvements program at any time by an affirmative vote of no fewer than six members of the Council.
- 3. The County Executive recommends the following capital project appropriation increases:

- 4. This increase is needed to accelerate the replacement of aging heart monitors/defibrillators with an inflationary adjustment. The recommended amendment is consistent with the criteria for amending the Capital Improvements Program (CIP) because it leverages significant non-County sources of funds provided through the Emergency Service Transporter Supplemental Payment Program.
- 5. The County Executive recommends an amendment to the FY21-26 Capital Improvements Program and a supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$534,000 for Heart Monitor/Defibrillator Replacement (No. 452201) and specifies that the source of funds will be Current Revenue: Fire.
- 6. Notice of public hearing was given and a public hearing was held.

#### PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This project provides for the purchase of Stryker LifePak15 heart monitor/defibrillators assigned to Montgomery County Fire and Rescue advanced life support (ALS) transport units, paramedic chase cars, and engines. These heart monitor/defibrillators have a useful life of five to eight years and must be replaced to ensure the operability of critical life-saving equipment.

#### **ESTIMATED SCHEDULE**

Equipment will be purchased in FY22.

#### **COST CHANGE**

Funds are added to accelerate the replacement of aging heart monitor defibrillators.

#### PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

Purchased heart monitor/defibrillators will replace aging units that are approaching the end of their useful life.

#### FISCAL NOTE

The project provides appropriation authority for a purchase funded through the Master Lease program and through Emergency Service Transporter Supplemental Payment Program revenues. Master Lease payments are assumed in the County Council Approved FY22 Budget. FY22 supplemental in Current Revenue: Fire for the amount of \$534,000.

- I. <u>FINDING:</u> The Office of Racial Equity and Social Justice (ORESJ) finds that Supplemental Appropriations #22-87 to the FY22 Capital Budget Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Service Heart Monitor/Defibrillator Replacement is unlikely to advance racial equity and social justice in Montgomery County as there is no evidence that the existing Capital Improvement Program (CIP) project (P452201) distributes resources in ways that consider risk or greatest need for Lifepaks—a key component of the Advanced Life Support (ALS) unit. In order to address equity impacts moving forward, ORESJ recommends that Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Services (MCFRS) consider the following:
  - Impact on communities at greatest risk of experiencing cardiac arrest during the distribution of Lifepaks; and
  - Impact on communities that experience extended EMS response times.
- II. <u>BACKGROUND</u>: The purpose of Supplemental Appropriation #22-87 is to fund the replacement of 81 aging heart monitor/defibrillators (Lifepaks) that are approaching the end of their useful life assigned to Montgomery County Fire and Rescue units and

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training facilities, with an inflationary adjustment. To assess whether a supplemental appropriation such as this may advance equitable outcomes in the county or exacerbate inequities, ORESJ would consider areas of greatest need in the county – such as communities at greatest risk of experiencing cardiac arrest and communities that experience longer EMS response times.

Nationally, research suggests that there are racial/ethnic disparities in pre-EMS CPR and cardiac arrest survival rates.<sup>1</sup> At the time of this analysis, similar localized research was not available, however county level data suggests there are related health inequities disproportionately impacting Black residents in the County.<sup>2</sup> Black residents are at greater risk of experiencing heart disease mortality when compared to other racial and ethnic groups.<sup>3</sup> It is therefore worth noting that in many emergency situations, MCFRS is responding to the consequence of a health inequity. While the department is not necessarily positioned to address the root causes of these inequities, it can plan for and distribute assistance in ways that help to reduce negative outcomes resulting from those inequities. Additionally, residents living in rural and suburban areas of Montgomery County are more likely to experience greater EMS response times compared to those living in urban and metropolitan areas.<sup>4</sup> The impact of this geographic difference on residents' experiences suggests that it is an important factor in determining resource distribution. When possible, these communities should also be prioritized based on their greater need.


