In an attempt to make it perfectly clear in Bill 23-17, Animal Control – Performance Animal – Violation that the performance animals ban does not effect agriculture now nor in the future, Councilmember Katz and Elrich propose a new subsection after (b) inserted between lines 113 and 114.

(c) Any activity, including agriculture and farming uses defined by Chapter 59, that uses animal's other than those identified as wild under Subsection 5-204(a)(4) is exempt from the prohibition in Subsection 5-204(b).

[(c)] (d) Regulations. The County Executive may issue regulations under Method 2, to interpret and enforce this subsection.



Fiscal Impact Statement Bill 23-17 Animal Control – Performance Animal – Violations

1. Legislative Summary

The proposed legislation amends current law prohibiting the display of performance animals, including non-human primates, felidae (lions, tigers, etc), and canidae (wolves) under animal cruelty laws. In addition, a person or business is prohibited from making money from the display of the animals listed in the bill.

2. An estimate of changes in County revenues and expenditures regardless of whether the revenues or expenditures are assumed in the recommended or approved budget. Includes source of information, assumptions, and methodologies used.

Bill 23-17 is not estimated to change County revenues or expenditures.

3. Revenue and expenditure estimates covering at least the next 6 fiscal years.

The proposed bill does not have an impact on revenues or expenditures.

Not applicable. Bill 23-17 does not have an impact on pension or insurance costs.
