SUBJECT: Expedited Bill 18-18, Human Rights and Civil Liberties – Human Trafficking Prevention Committee - Amendments

PURPOSE: Motion and Action – Council roll call vote required

Expedited Bill 18-18, Human Rights and Civil Liberties – Human Trafficking Prevention Committee - Amendments, sponsored by Lead Sponsor Councilmember Hucker and Co-Sponsors Councilmembers Rice, Katz, Council Vice President Navarro, Councilmember Berliner, Council President Riemer and Councilmember Elrich, was introduced on May 15. A public hearing was held on June 12 at which there were no speakers.

Bill 18-18 would modify the membership of the Human Trafficking Prevention Committee by removing the requirement that each voting member be a resident of the County and adding two voting members from the community.

Discussion

Bill 27-17, enacted by the Council on October 10, 2017 and signed into law on October 19, 2017, established the Human Trafficking Prevention Committee with 15 voting members. The Committee is a permanent part of the County government charged with recommending best strategies to combat human trafficking to the Executive and the Council. Expedited Bill 18-18 would add 2 voting members. Each of the new voting members should be a public member with a direct interest in the prevention of human trafficking. The current law requires each voting member to be a County resident. The Bill would modify this requirement by requiring that 9 of the 17 voting members be either a resident of the County or a County employee.

Council staff recommendation: enact the Bill as introduced. This Bill did not go to Committee. The Bill needs a motion to enact before the roll call vote on the Bill.
