I support an earth-friendly renovation of Ellsworth Dr., including natural surfaces (wood, stone, pavers) and plants. Synthetic turf is not natural, and it is not earth-friendly. It creates toxic plastic pollution that ends up in our rivers and, our oceans, in fish, birds, mammals, and finally, in us.

Greenwashed Product Contains Toxic Chemicals

The "blades of grass" in this "plastic carpet" contain PFAS (PFAS stands for a broad group of perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances), which have been associated with multiple health problems, including cancer. And we don't know the other toxic compounds that are in this product because the manufacturer (SYNlawn.com) considers this proprietary information. But when we don't have all the information, we really cannot make an informed choice?

Product Is Not Recyclable

Synthetic turf begins breaking down, creating microplastic pollution, from day one, its best day. It has a limited life span – especially when compared to wood, stone, pavers, and trees – and creates a disposal nightmare because no one is recycling synthetic turf. Rather, it is being dumped or shipped to an undisclosed address in Asia.

Product Not Designed For Ellsworth Drive Uses

Furthermore, according to the manufacturer's website, this product is recommended only for landscape, pets, play, rooftop, and golf. It is not designed for the very heavy foot traffic (pedestrians, farmers markets, etc) or vehicular use (emergency vehicles, delivery trucks and weekly Farmers' Market trucks) that will occur on Ellsworth Drive.

Maintenance Nightmare

Would you want to walk in a public place paved with Synlawn? Think about it. Urine and waste from people walking their dogs, chewing gum stuck to the "grass" blades, spit, bird poop, food and drink spilled. Would you let your child walk or crawl on this? And on a warm, sunny day, synthetic turf heats up hotter than asphalt. And, given climate change, things will heat up.

A Better Way

Urban development, coupled with climate change, intensifies the urban heat island effect. This calls for resilient solutions to make outdoor spaces more adaptable to environmental conditions and comfortable for people, while improving, not sacrificing, the environment. 




Here is a picture of an athlete after playing on a synturf and suffering severe burns compounded by toxins on the field

This letter is to OPPOSE the installation of artificial turf on Ellsworth Avenue in downtown Silver Spring. In addition, we OPPOSE the process for abandonment of that area. Plastic turf is an unacceptable alternative for our downtown, long proven to be unsafe, unhealthy, unsanitary, and unattractive. Our neighbors in the Seven Oaks—Evanswood Community Association have raised vehement objections to this proposal (see the messages you have received from Anne Vorce, Stephen Estrada, James Ehrman, and Cathy Kristiansen among others.)

We write as residents of Silver Spring for over 38 years who live about half a mile from the area proposed for coverage by this artificial turf and abandonment. In normal times, we would walk daily along Wayne Avenue, Ellsworth Drive and elsewhere in the downtown area. As frequent shoppers, browsers, and diners in Downtown Silver Spring, we treasure our diverse, environmentally conscious and vibrant community. Dear Chair Anderson and Planning Board members -

This letter is to express my opposition to Abandonment of the Right-of-Way No AB771 on Ellsworth
Drive, for the purpose of installing artificial turf. I also want to express strong support for many of the
comments submitted by others in opposition to the use of artificial turf in Downtown Silver Spring, in
particular the Sierra Club Montgomery County Group submitted June 28, and the Montgomery County
Stormwater Partners Network submitted on June 2. In addition, I call your attention to the comments of
Adam Ortiz on behalf of the Montgomery County Department of Environmental Protection (DEP)
expressed in correspondence with the County Council and attached to the testimony of Anne Vorce for
the hearing on July 30.

Although I am commenting as an individual, as the Water Issue Lead for the Sierra Club Montgomery County Group, I have a special concern with whether this project is compatible with the existing stormwater management facility given the context of increases in heavy precipitation events that are already occurring as a result of climate change, and which are not factored into current codes for the design of stormwater or other infrastructure. As indicated by DEP, the addition of synthetic turf on top of the existing impervious surface would be a missed opportunity to advance the County's obligations for stormwater management under the MS4 permit. This permit requires removal of impervious surfaces and treatment of stormwater runoff in older neighborhoods such as DTSS, which were not built to treat stormwater to the maximum extent practicable. And as indicated by the Stormwater Partners Network, it is not known whether the stormwater facility would capture degraded micro-plastic particles. However, the cleaning materials would generate non-stormwater discharges that would be in violation of the stormwater permit.

For these reasons, I urge you to recommend to the Montgomery County Council that this Right-of-Way not be Abandoned. Alternatively, that Abandonment is approved only on condition that stormwater management objectives are advanced, for example, by installing pervious pavers instead of synthetic turf or other forms of green infrastructure which is critical for increasing climate resilience.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter.

We advocate for actions that support the health and safety of our members and the general public in Montgomery County. For these reasons, we request that the Planning Board reconsider its June 18, 2020 decision to allow synthetic plastic turf carpet (Synturf, specifically SYNLawn's SYNTipede 343 product) to be installed on Ellsworth Drive as part of the Downtown Silver Spring proposal - Project Plan Amendment 91998005C / Site Plan Amendment 81999002M.

Overall, we strongly support the idea of continuing to invest in Ellsworth Drive as the heart of a walkable, livable, downtown Silver Spring. The farmers market, festivals, and other neighborhood amenities draw people to this transit-accessible area. However, the rationale for installing artificial turf in this location rather than alternate surface treatments that are safe for people and the environment was not adequately defined. We strongly oppose installation of Synturf on the road surface for the following reasons:

Installation of Synturf as proposed will result in plastic and chemical pollution of Sligo Creek and all of its downstream waterways, including the Anacostia River, the Potomac River and the Chesapeake Bay. Although it is proposed that the SYNtipede product will be used without an underlying layer of padding or crumb rubber bits, which is the most common microplastic pollution that comes from turf fields, the "blades" of artificial grass themselves detach, degrade, and flow into the storm drains. Walter Johnson High School had rivers of plastic "blades" wash off when it rains. These "blades" float, so they will not be captured in the storm drain settling tanks and will end up in Sligo Creek. It does not appear that the Montgomery County Department of Environment (DEP) has conducted testing to identify degraded microplastic particles smaller than the existing filter sizes.

Installation of Synturf as proposed will also result in chemical pollution of Sligo Creek and downstream waterways. Synturf grass "blades" are made with PFAS forever chemicals and toxic flame retardants that are dangerous to our health and should not be in our waterways. In addition, the safety sheet for the proposed glue to hold the Synturf to the asphalt says not to send it into storm drains, and it is not clear where the developer will put runoff. Furthermore, synthetic turf must be cleaned frequently with disinfectants, fabric softeners, and other toxic chemicals to remove a build-up of spilled food and drinks as well as biological contaminants such as blood, vomit, spit, sweat, urine, animal feces, etc. Furthermore, according to the Safety Data Sheet provided by the applicant and the manufacturer, vehicular fluid leakage on the turf (presumably from the emergency vehicles and delivery trucks that will be allowed) may need to be cleaned by using mineral spirits or dry cleaning fluid. However, it is illegal to put these substances on our streets and down our storm drains. Most artificial turf also contains antimicrobials, which are often toxic, to prevent acquisition of MRSA, a serious staph infection resistant to many antibiotics, from

contact with the artificial turf. Since COVID-19 lives on plastic for up to 3 days, synturf carpet manufacturers are now also alerting owners to use specific, powerful cleaners frequently. All of these chemicals will wash into the storm drains that lead to Sligo Creek.

The plastic blades, adhesives, and solvent-based wash products that will be required to clean the Synturf are materially very different from the materials and cleaning products used on ordinary concrete or asphalt streets. It is unlikely that the stormwater facilities under Ellsworth that now protect Sligo Creek will be able to filter out the adhesives and solvent-based wash products - not to mention any small particulate deterioration of the turf. Generating such "non-stormwater discharges" would be a violation of the county MS4 permit, and these types of pollutants would not be trapped by a particulate settling tank.

It's particularly important to note that all of these chemicals will also end up in the mouths of our children and pets playing on the Synturf, as well as the fish and other marine life in the waterways!

Installation of Synturf as proposed will result in increased heat in downtown Silver Springm It is well documented that synthetic turf results in temperatures up to 60 degrees F hotter than ambient temps, much hotter than grass, concrete, or even asphalt. The resulting surface is dangerous to play on and radiates heat into the air. The applicant's consultant provided a shade map but not a temperature map and "guessed" that the synthetic turf would be around 10 degrees hotter than the current asphalt. This is not consistent with actual thermal and infrared temperature readings taken by citizens around the county over the past several summers. This is an important issue since a hotter Ellsworth Avenue will discourage exactly the types of gatherings the proposed pedestrian mall area is supposed to encourage.

The proposed installation of Synturf seems counter to the manufacturer's warranty. Per the manufacturer's own literature, the particular version of Synturf proposed is not intended for use in a high traffic area. The carpet manufacturer warranty says it's for use on rooftops, playgrounds and dog parks. However, the proposed Ellsworth pedestrian mall have much heavier use by thousands of pedestrians plus carts, delivery vehicles, farmers markets, emergency vehicles, snowplows, etc. It is unclear if this type of heavy use will require more frequent repair or replacement of the entire surface, which would be very costly and disruptive.

Synturf is not recyclable. It is appalling that the Planning Board would approve use of tons of plastic made from petroleum that cannot be recycled and will end up in landfills like the artificial playing fields from several Montgomery County high schools. This decision is particularly disappointing given the County's Climate Emergency Resolution. The applicant indicated the Synturf "can be processed and used as a combustible fuel" but a strong goal of the County is to close the Dickerson Incinerator, so it is unclear where the used Synturf will go at the end of its limited lifespan.

We believe these serious concerns were not adequately addressed in the Staff Report or the Planning Board discussion and decision. On behalf of all the DTMG members across the County, we hope that the Board will reconsider this ill-advised decision, eliminate the synthetic turf from the proposal, and require the applicant to implement an environmentally sound alternative, such as natural grass or a permeable surface, or make no change at all to the surface on Ellsworth. Green plastic is not green space.
