Best Practices – follow FCGO 20-03

- 1. Gloves required for all patient encounters
- 2. Surgical mask and eye protection for all patient encounters
- 3. Employ proper decontamination procedures after patient care to include hand washing, shower, change of uniform, etc.
- 4. Stick to the **EMS PPE Plan** and you're good to go!
