

Attendance Data





End-of-Year Impact

Day Reviewed	Total Number of Chronically Absent Students	MCPS Chronic Absenteeism Rate	Reduction from Last Year, Same Time
6/13 (following last FULL day of instruction)	32,475	20.32%	-1.82%
6/16 (after 6/13 HALF day)	33,018	20.66%	-1.67%
6/17 (after 6/13 and 6/16 HALF days)	34,025	21.29%	-1.27%
6/18 (after 6/13, 6/16, and 6/17 HALF days)	34,936	21.86%	-0.95%
ire Ready	Net increase in chronically absent students = 2,461	Net increase in chronic absenteeism percentage = 1.54%	Net <u>decrease</u> in chronic absenteeism <u>reduction</u> = 0.87%
