Re: Racial Equity Impact Assessment (REIA) for Supplemental Appropriation (SA) #25-

63 Countywide Façade Easement

- I. FINDING: The Office of Racial Equity and Social Justice (ORESJ) finds that Supplemental Appropriation #25-63 Countywide Façade Easement is likely to advance racial equity and social justice in Montgomery County. A previous Capital Improvements Budget Equity Tool (CBET) analysis of the Façade Easement Program (No. 762102) and demographic data analysis in the proposed project areas demonstrate an understanding of and response to the major structural barriers affecting financial stability, wealth, and businesses owned by people of color and foreign-born residents in Montgomery County.
- **BACKGROUND:** The purpose of Supplemental Appropriation #25-63 Countywide II. Façade Easement Program (No. 762102) is to allocate \$500,000 in State Aid to the Department of Housing and Community Affairs for the Capital Improvements Program (CIP) Façade Easement Program (No. 762102), which will support small business and encourage private investment.

The Façade Easement program, which is part of DHCA's Neighborhood Revitalization Section, was initially funded in FY21<sup>1</sup>. The program helps transform the exteriors of commercial properties and/or businesses that are 10 years or older to help them meet current commercial standards and create more visually inviting and safer commercial

environments across the County<sup>2</sup>. The program works by reimbursing participating property and business owners up to 50% of the eligible costs for the design and construction of approved facade improvement projects and requires owners to maintain those improvements for a negotiated term via a facade easement agreement with the County<sup>3</sup>. Projects throughout the county are eligible, with priority given to projects meeting the following criteria<sup>4</sup>:

- are located in one of the program priority areas of Glenmont, Hillandale, Layhill, Long Branch, Montgomery Village or Wheaton; and/or
- are located in an Equity Focus Area\*5 within the County; and/or
- are mixed-use, but not exclusively used for or converted to housing; and/or
- have significant first-floor retail.

In FY24, eight businesses benefited from the Façade Easement Program (No. 762102), and \$289,902 private dollars were leveraged<sup>6</sup>. It is estimated that in FY25, 60 businesses will benefit from the program and more than 1 million in private dollars will be leveraged<sup>7</sup>.

ORESJ conducted a Capital Improvements Program budget equity (CBET) analysis for FY24 amendments to the FY23-28 CIP. In that analysis, ORESJ reviewed information provided by DHCA in response to the following CBET questions:

- 1. Does this project align with the county's policy to reduce and eliminate racial disparities and inequities?
- 2. What racial disparities or inequities in Montgomery County does this project seek to reduce or eliminate?
- 3. How does this project address the racial disparities and inequities you described?
- 4. Does this project (including its development, construction, or implementation) have the potential to create any unintended consequences?

5. Who and what resources did you consult in the preparation of this Budget Equity Tool response?

The conclusion of our analysis of DHCA's responses was that the project "aligns with Montgomery County's policy to reduce and eliminate racial disparities and other inequities" Below is an excerpt from ORESJ's analysis:

"The CBET response reflects a robust understanding of major structural barriers affecting the financial stability, wealth, and businesses owned by people of color. The project design appears to consider and respond well to these inequities by providing targeted assistance in neighborhoods with larger numbers of businesses owned by people of color."

III. ANALYSIS: Supplemental Appropriation #25-63 does not substantively alter the approaches or goals of the Countywide Façade Easement Program CIP. Based on available information, additional funding to the project will be focused on completing projects at Centers in Hillandale, Wheaton and Downtown Silver Spring. The department reported that "these areas have a large concentration of residents from diverse racial and ethnic backgrounds and these Centers may otherwise forego making improvements without the funding support of the CFIP/this State grant" 9.

ORESJ compiled the following demographic data about Hillandale, Wheaton, and Downtown Silver Spring compared to Montgomery County as a whole.

These demographics confirm the department's characterization of these areas as racially and ethnically diverse. Given this and ORESJ's previous analysis of the program, it is likely that this supplemental appropriation funding will contribute to reducing economic inequities that disproportionately burden businesses owned by people of color, immigrants, and other structurally disadvantaged groups.
