How the County Executive and Council build and approve the annual budgets



Two Budgets

Operating Budget: Services Annual Budget

Funded primarily through taxes and fees.

- K-12 Education
- Community College Education
- Public Safety: Police, Fire, Courts, Corrections and Sheriff
- Transportation: Roads, Traffic and Bus
- Social Services: Health, Income Maintenance and Other
- Environmental Protection
- Parks, Recreation and Libraries
- Land-Use Planning and Regulation
- Trash Collection and Disposal
- Economic Development
- Debt Service

Capital Budget: Facilities Six Year Budget

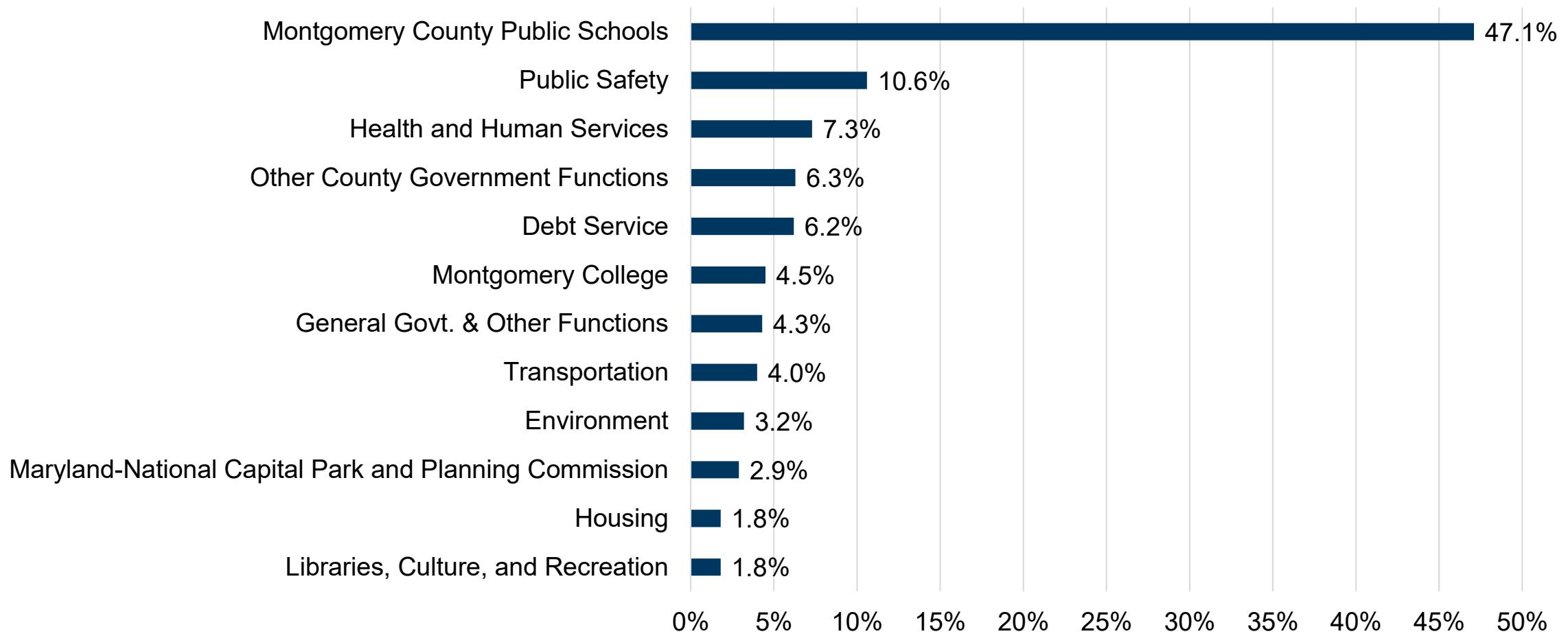
Funded primarily through bonds.

- Schools and College Facilities
- Roads and Bridges
- Water and Sewer Facilities
- Information Technology Infrastructure
- Library Buildings
- Police and Fire Stations
- General Government Facilities

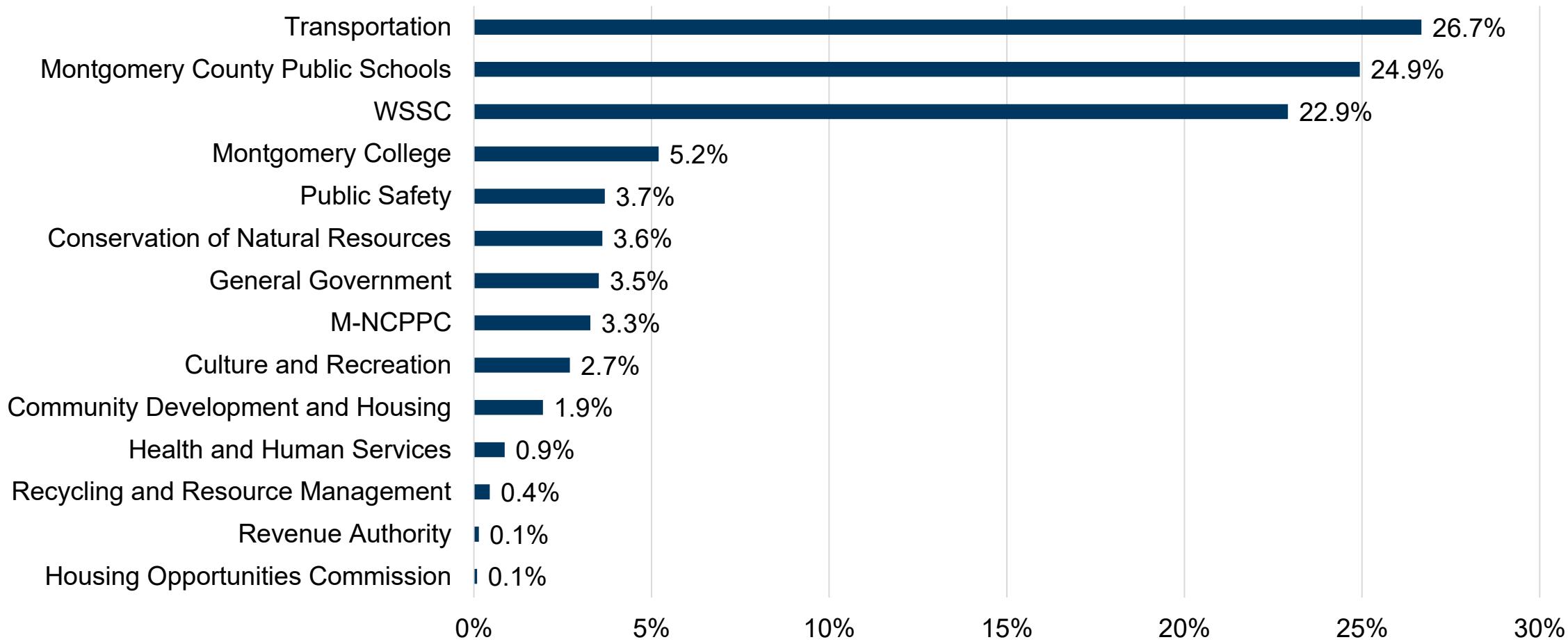
Operating Budget for FY26

C.E. Recommended Capital Budget for FY27-32

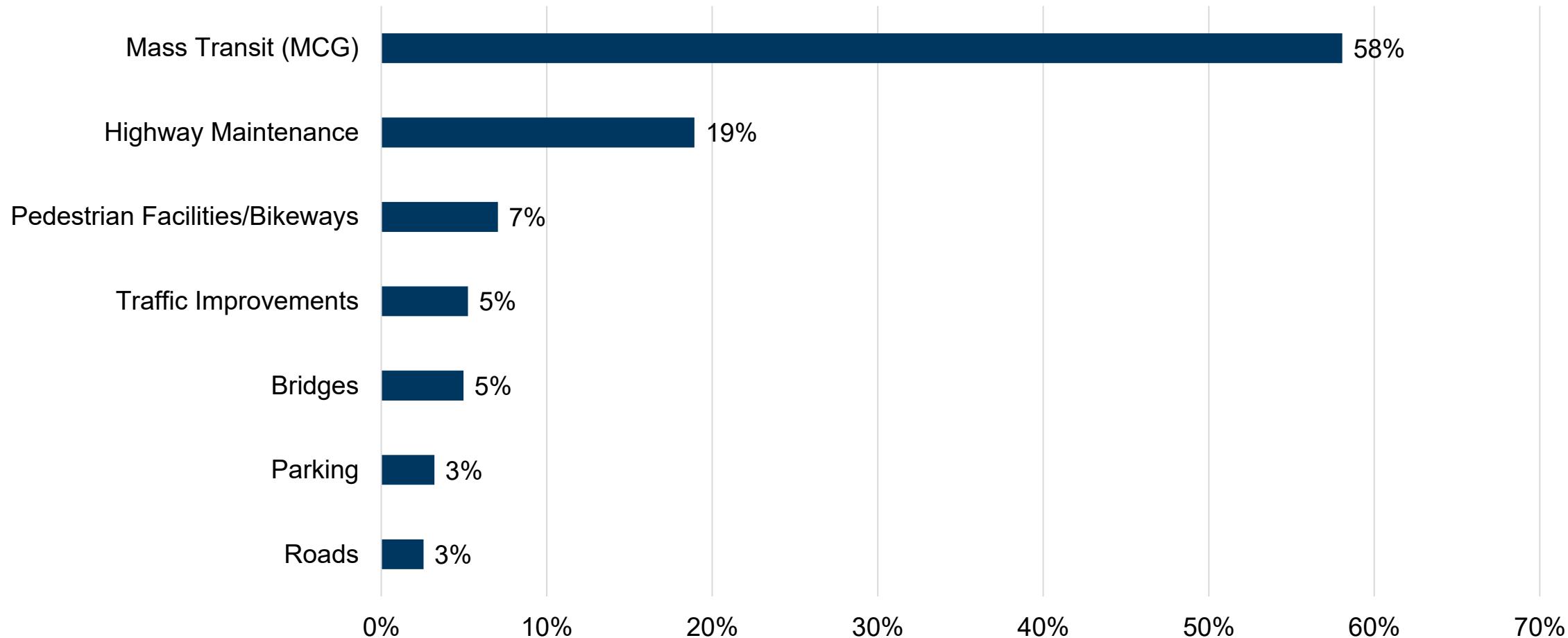
Expenditures by Category for \$8.6 Billion Budget for 6 years*

C.E. Recommended Capital Budget Transportation Sub-Categories for FY27-32

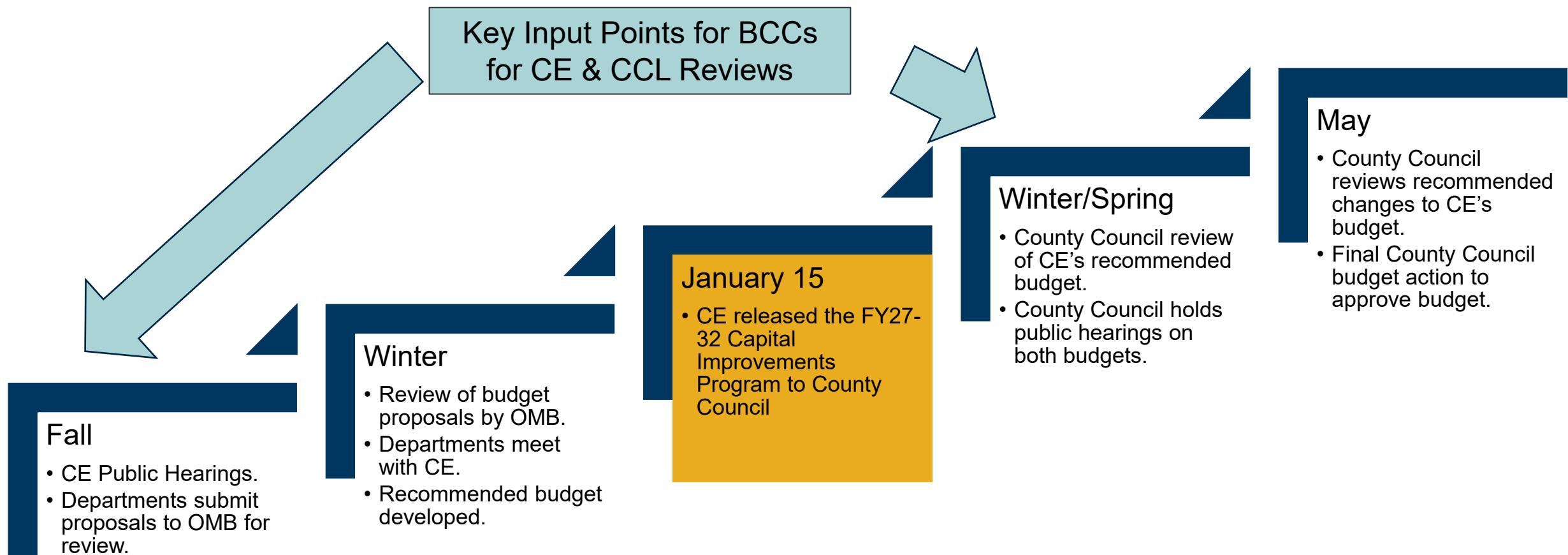
Design and construction of Flash B.R.T. and North Bethesda Station Entrance driving increased spending, but also supported with federal and state funds.

Countywide vs Site Specific CIP Projects

Countywide Projects

- Dollars not allocated to specific area.
- Maintenance of existing infrastructure.
- Spot enhancements such as intersection changes, ADA ramp upgrades, pedestrian island installations, etc.
- Examples: Pedestrian Safety Program, Streetlighting, Sidewalk Minor Projects.

Site Specific Projects

- Dollars allocated for specific project.
- Larger infrastructure projects that require significant planning, design, engineering, and construction investments.
- Multi-year process from initial design to completion.
- Examples: Capital Crescent Trail, Wheaton BiPPA, Fenton Street Cycletrack.

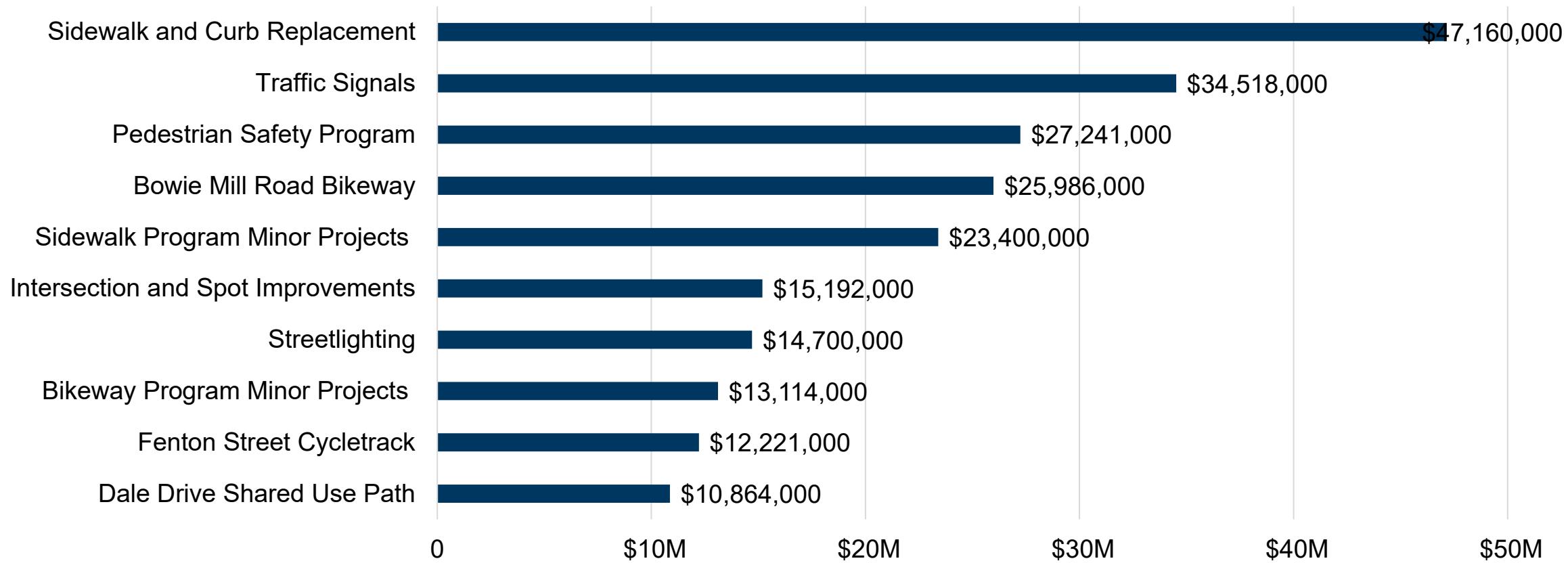
FY26 CIP Spending by Agency and Area

\$71,657,000 across DOT and Parks, lower than FY25 due to one time Safe Streets federal grant showing in FY25.

Options for Building Recommendations

1. **State general support or opposition** – state the project categories you want to see increased or decreased funding.
 - *Example* – support funding for sidewalks, bike lanes, and road safety audits.
2. **State support for specific projects** – state support or opposition to specific projects listed in current CIP or included in master plans but not currently funded.
 - *Example* – move forward with Bethesda and Silver Spring bike networks, sidewalk minor projects, etc. See next slide for the Planning Board's top ten ranked projects for the FY25 update cycle.
3. **Hybrid** – state general support areas and specific projects in that area

Example – Planning Board Priorities

The following is a list of project priorities from the Planning Board sent to the County Executive and Council for the FY25-30 update cycle.

5	Pedestrian	Level-of-Effort Sidewalk Retrofit Program
6	Bikeway	Capital Crescent Trail (Woodmont Ave to Elm St Park)
7	Bikeway	Montgomery Village Ave Sidepath (Stewartown Rd to City of Gaithersburg)
8	Pedestrian	Create new CIP program to improve trail crossings
9	Transportation Safety	Aspen Hill BiPPA
10	Pedestrian	Forest Glenn Pedestrian Tunnel
